SUCCESS IN RELATION TO APTITUDE TESTS SHOWN BY RECORDS

AVERAGE RUN 84-40; 82-31
University of Wisconsin Records Show Scores Compare with Vocational Choice

Success in relation to aptitude test scores is shown by records of the University of Wisconsin in a survey of recent years, according to Mr. Richardson, director of records.

The following question might well be asked on this subject:

Are scores on an intelligence test or scholastic aptitude test in any way related to occupational choices? Or to put the question differently, does the score that an individual makes on a scholastic aptitude test indicate in any way whether he is likely to be a success in a given occupation? The answer to this question is "yes," with certain qualifications. One cannot tell from a test rating whether a given individual will be successful in a specific occupation, but one can tell with some degree of accuracy whether an individual is more likely to be successful in one rather broad occupational field than in another. But even here one can only speak in terms of probabilities—one cannot be certain.

Some interesting data has been collected in this connection by the University of Wisconsin. During the course of several years they have administered a scholastic aptitude test to high school seniors and have collected information concerning their vocational choices. Results are now available on 34,472 senior boys and 42,479 senior girls. They have studied the relation between the

scores on the aptitude test and choice of occupation.

Here are some typical results: The median (middle) rank of the boys who intend to go into chemical engineering is 82, whereas the median rank of boys who intend to become barbers is 31. Likewise, the middle rank of the girls who intend to go into journalism is 84, and the middle rank of those who are planning on clerical work is 40. It should be pointed out that these are middle or average scores and apply therefore only to the typical individual attracted toward the several occupations. But these differences are great enough so that it is quite possible that a real difference exists between the scholastic aptitude of barbers and chemical engineers, or between successful journalists and filing clerks.

It is because of data such as this that the answer to the question at the beginning of this article is "yes." However, there are many other factors beside scholastic aptitude that determine success in any occupation. It is because a consideration of these other factors must be taken into account that the answer to the question must be a "qualified yes."
