December 28 and Saturday night, December 29, both returning to Chicago the morning of January 2. Elaborate New Year's Eve plans have been made by the management of Jack O'Lantern.

Skating, skiing, ski-joring, tobogganing, cutter-riding, sleighing, and all the other varieties of winter fun are available at the lodge while a special slide called Ash Can Alley is popular with visitors. An indoor skating rink assures skating on clear ice in any kind of weather while the rink is used for hockey games between the Eagle River Falcons, midwestern champions, and other teams on Sunday afternoons. The tours are designed on a very low rate basis. For the New Years tour the cost, including rail fare round-trip, pullman fare, accommodations at the lodge and all meals at the lodge, will total \$30 for the four days and \$26 for the three days while on the regular tours from January 4 to February 22, inclusive, the two-day cost covering the same items will be \$20. The tours after starting slowly last year, were tremendously popular in late January and throughout February when Chicagoans and other patrons in the Mid-West found that there was plenty of snow and plenty of fun in the north woods.
