Waukegan State Bank Announces Dividend

Barrett, state auditor, on December 22 announced that he has authorized payment of a 5 per cent dividend, amounting to \$57,756.08, to the depositors of the Waukegan State Bank, Waukegan, Ill. This is the first dividend to be paid since the bank closed. The checks were given out Monday, Dec. 24.

In addition to this dividend, \$316,048.84 has been paid to preferred creditors and \$390,950.03 has been paid on bills payable.

This dividend is from funds acquired from the receiver of the Stockholders Liability Suit.

palace built in another garden so that the Forbidden City might not be defiled by them. When the season came to go out of the city to the summer palace, the emperor was taken along and kept on an island. With diabolical cruelty she had the only places from which he could view the lake from his quarters, bricked up, and left nothing but a court and some cedar trees.

Water is not abundant in Peking and streams are made the most of, so that it is not surprising that a wonderful cold spring coming out of the base of one of the hills should have been called the Jade Fountain, or that now there is a bottling works for soft drinks where once the empress passed. The water comes out from the rocks into a pool where it takes on the color of light jade. The water is cold, but even so it did not take an American student long to go in swimming in his underwear. Where is tradition on a hot day?

Water from this fountain is led into a beautiful lake on the shores of which are the buildings of the summer palace. Here we sat and had tea and were fortunate enough to see one of the little king fishers with the bright blue feathers from which the jewelry is made. The pink lotus here were in full bloom and the blossoms were so fragrant. I do not think these famous Peking lotus are much different from those at home except that the color is pink. The white ones commonly grown for their edible roots and seeds have flowers a little smaller than the American. The outflow from the lake provides water for a canal running from the summer palace to the city and main palaces. Along this canal, in the imperial barges the empress used to be taken to the summer palace. When the emperor rode out the road was first sprinkled in golden colored sand, then all the village people were told to stay in doors, and when the last window and door was barred, he and his retinue would come by in a cloud of golden dust. Golden dust might well shut out annoying sights but I wonder what they used for the odors?

This letter is just a bit of what I hope I can tell you about Peking from time to time and I am sorry it has taken so long to write.

Community Service Sponsors Activities

Community Service Inc. of Highland Park again this year as in the past several years has sponsored many activities for the people of this community. The center of these activities is the Community Center located on the corner of Laurel and McGovern Avenues. Other recreation projects are also conducted in other neighborhoods of the city by the staff of the Community Center. A partial list of the activities conducted is as follows:

Boys basketball—on Tuesdays and Thursday nights of each week the boys and young men of the city meet at the Community Center for basketball play. Any young man or group of young men in this community is welcome to join the group. A league is now being organized and play will follow a set schedule after the first of the year. Now is a good time to join this group for those who are interested.

Girls basketball—the girls and young women of the city meet at the Community Center on Monday night of each week. At this time the girls play basketball, volleyball, and badminton, with more than a few of them trying to master the art of the game of table tennis. Persons interested in this project are asked to come to the Community Center on Monday nights or call for further information.

Highland Park Band—to add variety to the program the musicians of the city hold their practice sessions at the Community Center every Tuesday evening.

United States Naval Reserve—on Wednesday nights of each week the Communication branch of the Naval Reserve meets at the Community Center to practice radio, signaling and other naval technique.

Boy Scouts—a troop of Boy Scouts meets regularly at the Community Center on Wednesday nights. This troop is very eager to have other boys join in their scouting work and enjoy some of the sport they have playing games before and after their meetings.

Girl Scouts—the Girl Scout troop from Elm Place School meets at the Community Center on Thursday afternoons. At this time they hold their meetings, practice scouting, play games, work at handicraft, and many other interesting recreation projects.

Grade School Basketball—because of the fact that Elm Place School is now without gymnasium facilities

the boys from this school use the Community Center for their practice sessions and games on Wednesday and Friday afternoons. Other schools are also helped with their basketball work from time to time.

Holiday Recreation Classes—during the vacation periods in the schools, the Community Center is opened for supervised play for both the grade schools and the high school, the grade school boys meeting in the mornings and the high school boys in the afternoons. The Center is also open on Saturday morning throughout the year for boys from the grade schools.

Cubs—a Cub pack composed of boys of Cub age hold their meetings at the Community Center on every other Saturday morning. Younger boys of this city are welcome to join this pack. The ages are from nine to twelve.

Mens Volleyball—volleyball for the business man of the community is sponsored by Community Service on every Thursday night at the Ravinia Community House. This group is open to any man in Highland Park who likes this type of recreation.

Badminton—a group has been recently organized at the Ravinia Community House to play Badminton on Monday nights. This is a new game to this community and one that is becoming quite popular with both the men and the women. About 25 men and a like number of women are now meeting regularly on this night to play.

Basketball League—a grade school basketball league has been organized to take care of the grade schools in this high school district. A regular schedule is followed by each of the members in the league, the officiating and supervision being done by the staff of Community Service, Inc.

Social Functions—the staff of Community Service also among its many other projects helps out in the community and neighborhood social activities by helping with organization, leadership, songs, and offers other general assistance.
