

Standard Oil Announces New Job for R. E. Wilson

Standard Oil Company of Indiana recently announced the resignation of Dr. Robert E. Wilson as a director and vice-president in charge of research and development and his appointment as vice-chairman of the board of directors of its large eastern subsidiary, Pan American Petroleum and Transport Company. The change became effective January 1.

Edward G. Seibert, president of Standard of Indiana, is chairman of the Pan American board. Dr. Wilson will be transferred to Pan American's main office in New York City to give his full time to the operations of that company and its subsidiaries.

Coincident with this change, Harry F. Glair, general manager of manufacturing, has been elected to a seat on the company's board of directors, effective at once.

Some of the duties Dr. Wilson has handled for the Indiana company will be taken over by Bruce K. Brown, manager of the development and patent department, others by Dr. F. W. Sullivan, who will be transferred from the Whiting, Indiana, research laboratories to become general research director in the main office in Chicago. Other duties of board executive character will be handled by the directors.

Joining Standard of Indiana in 1922, Dr. Wilson had charge of its chemical engineering research and built up a large engine laboratory for work on motor fuels and lubricants. In 1929 he was given the responsibility of organizing and directing the development and patent department. He was made a member of the board of directors in 1931 and put in charge of all research, development and patent work.

In recent years he has devoted much time to special business transactions and other phases of executive management, as a director of Standard of Indiana and of various subsidiary companies.

Harry F. Glair, new director, began work with Standard at the Whiting refinery in 1906. After taking

time off to complete a course in mechanical engineering at the University of Illinois with the class of 1912 he advanced from the drafting room through a series of executive positions until he became manager of the plant in the period from 1929 to 1931. He was transferred to Chicago in August, 1931, as assistant general manager of manufacturing, and promoted to general manager in January, 1933.

In connection with the shift, Mr. Brown acquires added responsibilities regarding the patent and development work which protects and exploits the scientific advances made by the company. Mr. Brown is both a chemist and an attorney, a graduate of the University of Illinois. He held several positions as research director and patent attorney with other firms before joining Standard early in 1929.

The new general director of research, Dr. F. W. Sullivan, is a graduate of the University of Michigan. He remained there as an instructor for two years following 1921, and joined the research staff of Standard at Whiting as assistant director in 1923. He became director of the Whiting research staff in 1931. Dr. Sullivan is the author of many technical treatises and the inventor of several processes used and products made by the company.

New License Plan For Highwood Autos

The City of Highwood has changed its city ordinance covering the sale of the city automobile licenses. In the past vehicle tags have been issued at the start of the city fiscal year, May 1. However, beginning in 1936, the city vehicle tags will go on sale Jan. 1 to coincide with the state license sales. This year, tags

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will be sold May 1 and will be good for the balance of the year, until Dec. 31, 1935. The cost of these tags will be only two-thirds of the regular yearly rate.

The rates will be as follows: Passenger cars, \$2; trucks (A-B), \$3.33; trucks (C-D), \$4.67; trucks (E-F), \$6.67; All trucks over (E-F) \$10.

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
