Consumer's Corner

A new fruit, arriving on the market in quantities, at a price we can all afford, in the time of greatest need of such an addition to vary the monotony of the winter diet, is indeed news. The fruit is the attractive calavo you have been seeing for sale locally and the reason, a crop of calavos such as California has never before produced.

Since the calavo has never before been available in such quantities, we know you will be interested in some suggestions as to how to serve them.

But first to prepare them. Nothing was ever simpler. Do not remove the skin until you have halved the fruit lengthwise and removed the seed. Then peel if it is to be used in slices or rings or cut in dice. The skin of the softened fruit will separate easily from the green flesh beneath. If it is to be served instead in strictly California style, on the half shell, your work of preparation is over. Serve on a bed of salad egreens with lemon juice and salt or a sharp French dressing.

If quantities must go further, combine the fruit in slices, cubes, balls, or wedges with any vegetable such as beets, carrots, tomatoes, onions, asparagus, and celery.

There is no limit to the fruits that will lend their combined flavors to a successful salad. Or serve sliced calavo on beds of lettuce or any available salad green. Sea foods and calavos combine in salads as if intended for that very purpose. simple tart dressing is usually pre-

Serve a calavo and chicken entree on your next luncheon menu. Calavos belong to the list of fruits which are not improved by cooking, so the diced calavo is added to the creamed chicken just before serving. Announce Examination For Position of Fort Sherdan Postmaster

At the request of the Postmaster General, the United States Civil Service Commission announces an open competitive examination to fill the position of postmaster at Fort Sheridan. It is expected that appointments will be made as a result of this examination unless it found in the interest of the service to fill the vacancy by transfer or promotion. This is not an examination under the Civil Service Act and rules, but is held under an Executive order of July 12, 1933 providing for such procedure. The position carries a salary of \$2,300 per year.

The Post Office Department will not appoint to the position of Postmaster any of the following; the husband or wife of a rural carrier, a person concerned in a contract for carrying the mails, either as contractor, sub-contractor, or surety, nor any member of his immediate family.


