ACCIDENT VICTIM SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Condition of Stanley Williams Improves; Accident Cause Still a Mystery

The condition of Stanley Williams 17, of Libertyville, who was taken to the Highland Park Hospital on Friday night by Harold Larson of Fox Lake who found Williams lying on the side of the Skokie highway west of Highland Park, has greatly improved, but not sufficiently to permit questioning to determine the exact manner in which he was injured, although the fact that he was wearing ice skates makes it probable that he was struck while skating on the road.

Larson said that Williams had evidently been lying on the pavement for some time as his hair was frozen to the cement. Police Chief Ed Moroney stated that it was possible that Williams was hitching behind an automobile and was hurried to the pavement, but that from the appearance of his clothes, it is more likely that he was struck by an oncoming car.

Williams' injuries include a fractured skull, a broken leg and severe bruises.

Williams, who has been staying with his sister, Mrs. Willard Wollbrink of East street, Highwood, a suburb of Highland Park, had gone ice skating along the highway, Mrs. Wollbrink told the police. He had left early in the evening and it was 11:30 o'clock at night when Larson found him lying beside the highway. Williams was still wearing his ice skates when found, but physicians who examined him said it was unlikely that he could possibly have sustained the injuries from a fall while skating.

Announce Examination for Postmastership of Highland Park

A competitive examination for the postmastership of Highland Park has been announced by the United States Civil Service Commission at the request of the Postmaster General. Applications must be in the hands of the Postmaster General by February 12.

Several local men, including Hugo L. Schneider, Walter Meierhoff, L. R. Rigdon, G. M. Sheahan, Herman Schwery, W. Cunningham, J. Johnson and Daniel Cobb are known to be seeking the position and it is probable that others will be in the field.

This examination is held under the President's Order of July 12, 1933, and not under the civil service act and rules.

Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated upon their education and training, business experience, and fitness.

Apply to the secretary of the board of civil service examiners at the post office in this city or to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C., for application Form 10, and Form 2213 containing definite information in regard to the examination.

Applications must be properly executed on Form 10 and filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C., prior to the hour of closing business on the date specified above.

NINETEEN CANDIDATES FILE FOR PRIMARIES

Three for Mayor, Two for Police Magistrate, and Nineteen for Commissioners

Nineteen candidates have filed for Highland Park's city primaries to be held Feb. 26. Three have filed for the mayoralty, two for police magistrate, and fourteen for the four openings as commissioners.

Filed for the mayoralty are William Dooley, 48 Elm Place; R. P. Sherer, 34 Lake Avenue, and Daniel Cobb, 284 East Park Avenue.

The two candidates for police magistrate are Charles C. Buell, 880 Roslyn place, and Herman Schwery, 514 Laurel avenue, present holder of the office.

The fourteen candidates for the offices of commissioner are: Robert R. Bosworth, of 2265 Lincolnwood road; W. J. Brown, 709 Ridgewood drive; George W. Carr, 1271 Wade street; W. P. Cawley, 845 Ridgewood drive; Ernest I. Dresher, 268 Central avenue; Lyle Sourley, 271 Cedar avenue; Robert J. Greenslade, 148 South Second street; William Hoermann, 835 Forest avenue; William Koller; Florence T. Law, 27 North Linden avenue; William A. Ralph Jr., 93 Clifton avenue; Joseph H. Taylor, 32 Beverly place; Fred A. Tucker, 515 Oakwood avenue; and J. H. Zimmer, 423 Oakwood avenue. Of these candidates, four are present office holders seeking reelection, namely, Lyle Sourley, Robert Greenslade, Joseph Taylor and Julius Zimmer.

With the closing of filing the campaign will be launched with a series of meetings to be addressed by the candidates for the various offices. Under the commission type of government in vogue in Highland Park candidates do not affiliate themselves with any political party.

In this election two candidates will be selected to run for mayor, and eight for commissioners in the general city election in April. As only two filed for police magistrate they will oppose each other in the April election, no real contest being possible at the primary, as two will run in the April primary anyway.

All those entered in the primaries are well known citizens in Highland Park and many have lived here for years. It is felt that, as a whole, the group is representative of the high standard demanded by Highland Park citizens for their public officials.

HIGHLAND PARK READY FOR PRESIDENT'S BALL

Local Celebration To Be Dance and Card Party; Public Invited

Plans have been completed for Highland Park's participation in the nation wide celebration of President Roosevelt's birthday on Wednesday, January 30. The local celebration, which will be held at the St. James hall, will be in the form of a dance and card party, with a prize awarded each table. Play at the tables will follow the pivot system and for that reason parties of four are urged to make up their own tables.

President Roosevelt's speech will be tuned in by Mr. C. L. Larson of the North Shore Radio Shop. The hall will be decorated for the occasion in bluebird blue and silver. Refreshments will be served.

Tickets may be secured from Gsell's drug stores in Highland Park and Ravinia, the Highland Park Pharmacy, Lencioni's Delicatessen, Zengler and Moran cleaners, the Moraine Grocery and from members of the committee. Gregory Sheahan is local chairman in charge of arrangements and ticket sales.

Seventy per cent of the proceeds will stay in Highland Park to help local victims of infantile paralysis, while the remaining thirty per cent will go to the President's Birthday Ball Commission for Infantile Paralysis Research.

Both the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph offices will receive names to be added to the joint birthday greeting to the President which will be signed with the names of all those who wish to congratulate the President.
