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ACCIDENT VICTIM SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Condition of Stanley Williams Improves; Accident Cause Still a Mystery

The condition of Stanley Williams 17, of Libertyville, who was taken to the Highland Park Hospital on Friday night by Harold Larson of Fox Lake who found Williams lying on the side of the Skokie highway west of Highland Park, has greatly improved, but not sufficiently to permit questioning to determine the exact manner in which he was injured, although the fact that he was wearing ice skates makes it probable that he was struck while skat-
