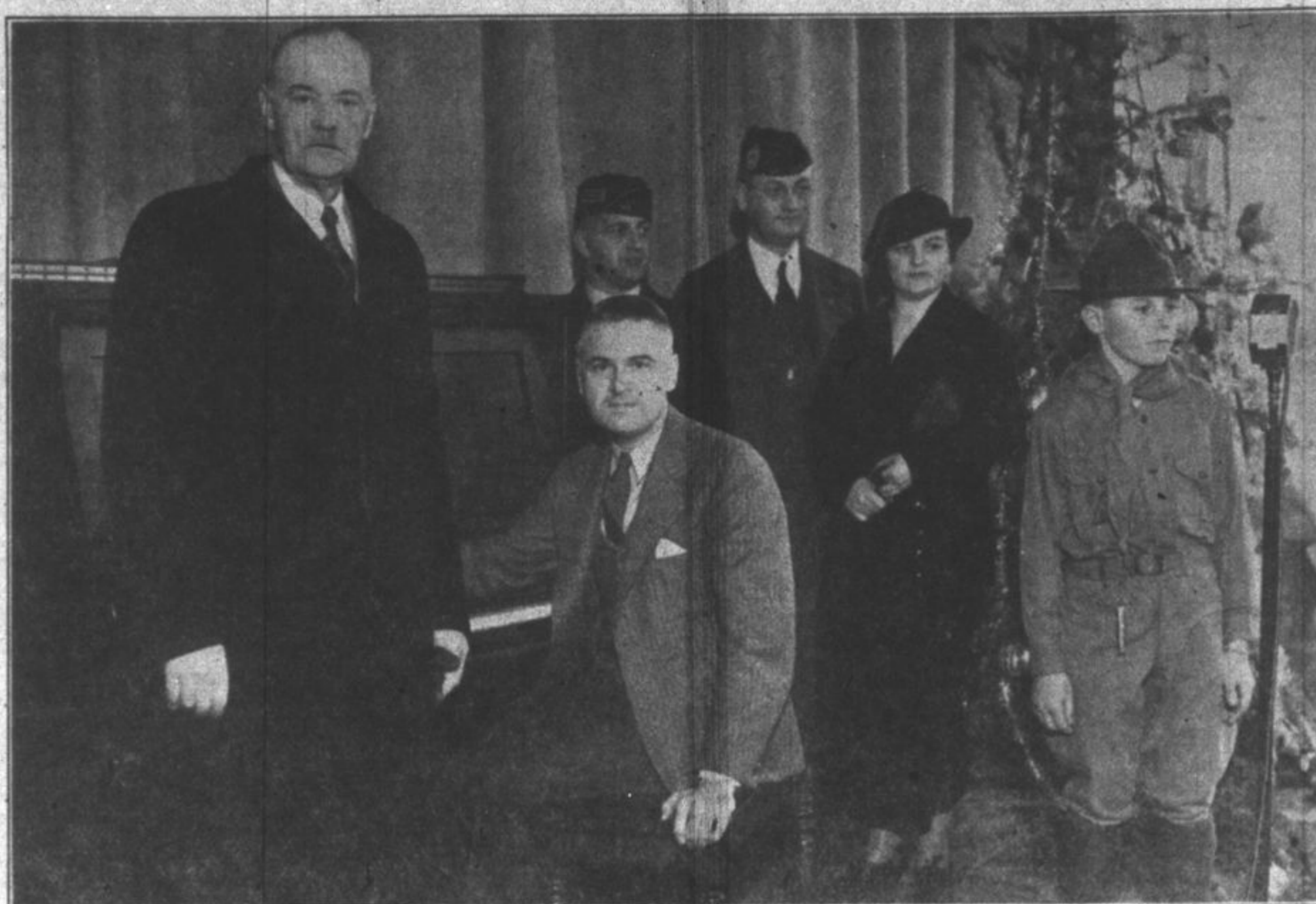


AN ECHO FROM CHRISTMAS WEEK

The cast is as follows: Karl Berning as Damon Wells, James Wennermark as Inspector Curtiss of the New York police department, Enid Phillips as Jessica Wells, Laura Browning as the aunt, Ross Hickman as Ben Weston, Bill Stieglitz as Stanley Vance, Bob Arnold as Dr. Kendall, Sarah Ann McClerman as Daphne Martin, Eileen Thompson as Hattie, and Max Sarnoff, whose relighting remains secret the Irish housekeeper. Others in the cast are Margaret Patton and Bob Hughes. The play opens with Jessica Wells, as chief in the cast of a play completing its try-out before being brought to New York.
