Chicago Hockey League to Have Busy Week

For the second consecutive week, the Chicago Hockey League will find itself busy with many league games. No less than ten games are scheduled during the week with the outstanding battle at the Chicago Stadium, Sunday, Jan. 27, when the Baby Ruths play an International skirmish against the Essex Frontiers of Canada.

The senior group games include double headers on Thursday night and Sunday afternoon, with the curtain-raiser starting at 8 and 2 o'clock, respectively.

Thursday night the Whiting Mads of Indiana meet Jones and Baumrucker, defending champions, in a Metropolitan sector game, and the Oak Park six face Post in the Stadium Division, at the Stadium.

With teams equally balanced in regards to man-power and ability, both the Senior and Intermediate Division races are rounding into nip-and-tuck affairs.

The three leading clubs in each division at the end of the playing schedule will play in a round-robin series for the championships, and fans will have the opportunity of seeing some of the best hockey ever displayed in the midwest.
