

Ex-Service Men Favor Appointment of Loesch as Highwood Police Chief

A new political, non-partisan club has been formed in Deerfield Township by the ex-service men in Highwood Wednesday, Jan. 23, and the following officers were elected for the coming year: Chairman Raymond Suzzi; vice chairman, Clarence Monahan; treasurer, Angelo Fabbri; secretary, James P. Hickey, and sergeant at arms, Francesco Santi. Five trustees: George Rettig, Julian Baruffi, Paul Costa, Rocco Camminitti, and Benny Lonngren.

The committee on constitution and by-laws reported that they had drawn up these articles and were ready to submit them, and upon reading, were corrected as needed and adopted.

Meetings will be held by-monthly, the second and fourth Wednesday of every month, but due to the closeness of the coming elections, meetings will be held every Wednesday evening at 234 North Avenue until after the spring elections.

The purpose of the organization is to provide the ex-service man with some way to express himself politically, and to stand for good, clean conservative government, municipal legislation favoring the children of the community, playgrounds, etc., standing squarely behind a candidate regardless of party.

The organization also will favor a candidate for mayor, who will seek appointment of former chief of police S. P. Loesch to the position formerly held by him.

The purposes of the organization as set forth in the constitution of the league are as follows:

1. To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America.
2. To advocate the Australian ballot in the primary.
3. To promote and support qualified and competent ex-service men for public office, who have proven to be qualified to municipal, township and state offices.
4. To insist in economy in public office by incumbents.
5. To insist on legislation which will guarantee the keeping open of all schools, and no further reduction in educational funds.
6. To encourage good, clean, conservative government in all tax spending bodies in the state of Illinois.
7. And to organize in each township of Lake County as many chapters of this organization as may be required, such chapters to become a part of the parent body.

Locally, in Highwood, the organization favors a review of the city ordinances, some of which are antique, and not suited to present needs, and easy accessibility to such revised ordinances by citizens, also

a larger police force to assure adequate police protection, and in fact, everything that is good for the community.

The Ex-Service Men's Non-Partisan Voters League plans to take a very prominent part in the coming elections, both in the township and the city of Highwood.

All who have seen service in the army, navy or marine corps at any time are eligible, as well as their dependents and descendants who are bona fide American citizens and have arrived at voting age.

New Regulation On Local Plumbing Bids

Under provisions of an announcement made in Highland Park, all plumbing bids that exceed \$100 are to be delivered to the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce where they will be held for a time prior to delivery to the awarding authority.

The new plan was announced by Howard Moran, chairman of zone six code compliance committee of the divisional code authority.

Such bids, if they are mailed, must reach the Chamber 24 hours before the scheduled time for opening, or, if mailed, at least two hours before the scheduled opening hour.

Similar practices, under code authorities in various lines of industry, have been inaugurated in a number of cities through Chamber of Commerce offices.

Calavos Require Long Period for Ripening

A new reason for calling attention to calavos, the semi-tropical fruit which has always represented luxury because of its limited production in this country, is that California has at last succeeded in producing large enough crop to bring the fruit within the reach of the smallest budgets.

When we consider the length of time it takes to produce the calavo, we understand better its unique qualities. Many varieties remain on the tree for a period of from seven

months to a year. During this time the fruit is gradually accumulating the full flavor which is bound up with the contemporary development of the fruit oil content. Calavos are not picked until the zenith has been reached in mineral, nutrient and flavor values. For this purpose a laboratory test is necessary to judge unfailingly the proper stage of maturity or ripeness.

Back of the long period of actual production of each individual calavo

is the horticultural story of years of unproductive investment of money and energy, before this tropical fruit was successfully transplanted to take its place in the American menu of today.

The accompanying salad recipe is a favorite among connoisseurs, who appreciate the perfect blending of sea food flavors with the subtle creaminess of the calavo.

Salmon Salad
1 cup flaked salmon

1 cup sliced celery (rounds)
Lemon juice
3 tablespoons mayonnaise
2 calavos
Salt.
Combine flaked salmon, sliced celery, few drops lemon juice and mayonnaise, and mix lightly. Cut calavos into halves lengthwise, remove seeds and sprinkle cut portions with lemon juice and salt. Fill centers with salmon mixture. Serve on lettuce garnished salad plates. Serves 4.
