yet paid, is \$40,016.01.  
Amount of Lake County's share of the deposit in Waukegan State Bank is \$10,154.01.  
These two amounts would more than cover the overdraft above mentioned.

Amounts owing to Lake County from various townships, for their proportion of county farm and county hospital accounts is \$249,023.45.  
This amount was larger, but some townships have paid.

The county's share of unpaid taxes, personal and real, estimated upon 80 per cent collection is \$180,000.00.

Legal action is being instituted against the townships for the payment of their share of the county hospital and county farm accounts, and also to collect past due taxes.

The total of these figures, which are our assets, and due the county, is \$479,203.46.

If the above accounts were paid to the county, we would be on a cash basis, with a credit cash balance on hand of \$132,122.11.

There is a lack of understanding among our taxpayers concerning fees turned in by fee earning offices. The state law requires that a fee-earning office pay all the salaries and a few minor items, from its earnings, but all other expenses, supplies, printing, etc., are to be paid from the general fund. Consequently, amounts turned in by fee earning offices, shown as "earnings of the office" are misleading, for the reason that large expense items of their offices are paid from the general fund.

**Lake County Is In Debt Really Only \$47,081.35**

H. D. Kelsey, chairman of the Lake County board of supervisors, and John D. Thomas, chairman of the finance committee of the board, present below, to the taxpayers of Lake County, a financial statement of the true condition of the county finances, as of Jan. 28th:

Much has been said and printed lately, some of which is misleading. Like every other county in the state, as well as practically every municipality, Lake County is pressed for funds.

There is a reason for all things, and a reason why Lake County is now where it is. Reading the following statement carefully. Present overdraft, after settlement with the 211 tax spending bodies of Lake County has been paid in full, according to the tax collections of the county, is \$47,081.35.

This overdraft is occasioned by the transferring of one fund (or budget) to pay another, which amount must eventually be replaced in the fund from which it was borrowed.

Amount of outstanding unpaid bills is approximately \$125,000.00. Anticipation tax warrants against the county is \$175,000.00 (which is \$75,000 less than last year).

Adding these figures we have a total obligation of \$347,081.35.

To offset these obligations, we have various amounts due to Lake County as follows: Deposit in North Chicago Bank, which amount has been awarded the county as a preferred claim, but not
