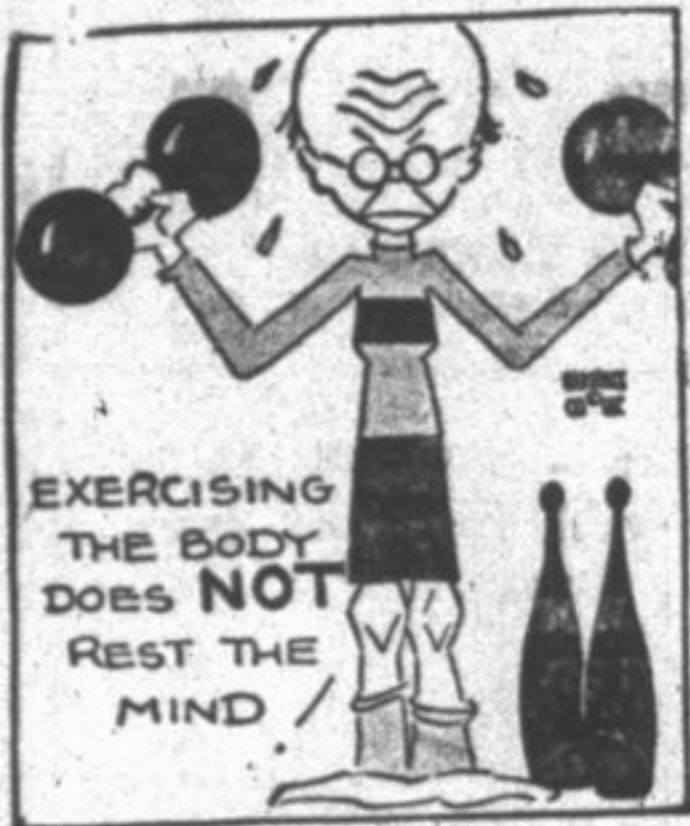

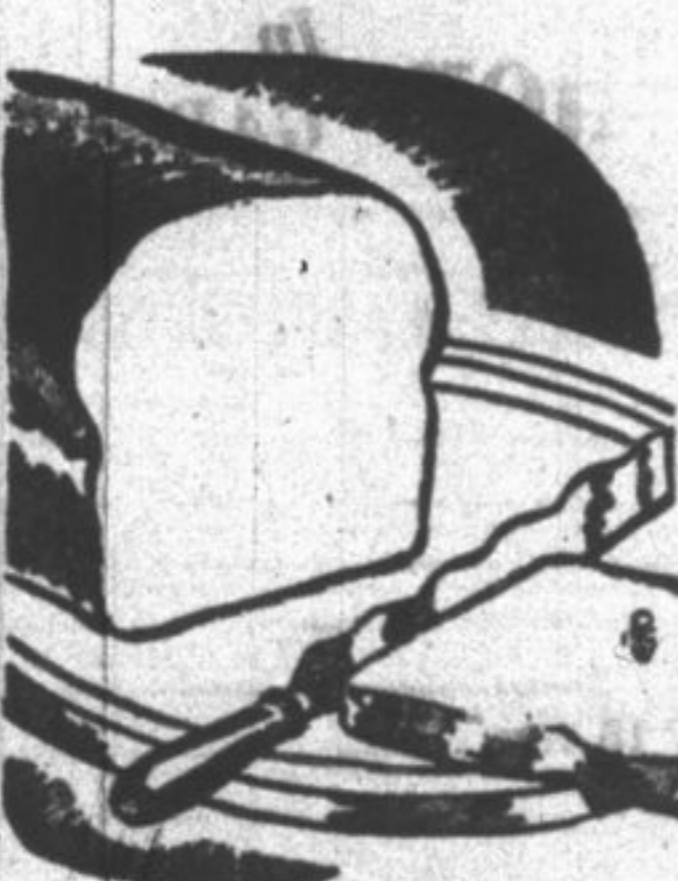
Mr. Howard Will, of Deere Park, was instrumental in arranging for Gotselig to speak.
