Deerfield Observes Centennial Year

This is the centennial year for Deerfield. It was just 100 years ago that the Cadwells, the first white settlers, came here. Deerfield was first known as Cadwell's corners. Jacob and Rubie Rich Cadwell and their seven children, five sons and two daughters, moved from Addison county, Vermont, to Illinois in the year 1835. The father and four sons pre-empted government land in Lake county upon a portion of which the village of Deerfield was later located. The Cadwells were large handsome men. Two daughters of Phileman were identical twins, named Ellen and Helen. The first school teacher in this vicinity was Rosella Cadwell, the first clerk elected at the first township meeting at which Lyman Wilmet, of Wilmot corners, was moderator, was held at the Green Bay house in Highland Park, and Edwin Cadwell was clerk. Caleb Cadwell was elected supervisor and Phileman Cadwell overseer of the poor. In those days two men did the work of a small community whereas now one man handles huge sums for poor relief under the title of supervisor. Caleb Cadwell was the first post master in Deerfield. Annie McCraren Cadwell was the first teacher in the Ravinia school. She was the wife of Orren Madison Cadwell. All of the Cadwell sons and daughters married into local pioneer families. Ruby Rosella married Richard Hendee, Philemon took Electa Clarilla Hendee for his wife, Caleb was united to Eleanor Galloway, Edwin married Mary Duffy, and Jerusha Rosina Cadwell married William P. Welch. The Cadwells moved to California in a wagon caravan drawn by oxen when Deerfield became too crowded for their large farming activities. In 1849 Deerfield township was called Le Clair in honor of an influential half breed (French and Indian) village near Half Day. The history of Deerfield contains a good account of the Cadwell family. Miss Marie McCraren of Highland Park who attended the Deerfield school and whose father was a Civil war veteran, has suggested to the local Deerfield editor that it would be very apropos for the many Deerfield civic organizations (Rotary, C. of C., Legion, Woman's club, schools etc.) to join in a one hundredth anniversary celebration. MRS. MAURICE HODGES STRUCK BY AUTO

Suffers Broken Leg and Wrist; Two Other Accidents Over Week-end

Mrs. Maurice Hodges, 72, of 1410 Judson Avenue, was taken to the Highland Park Hospital suffering from a broken leg, a broken wrist and bruises about the head and face last Tuesday evening, after being struck by a Plymouth car driven by S. D. Inman, 2312 Elias avenue, Zion City. The accident occurred at 5:20 p. m. Mrs. Hodges was crossing the Green Bay Road at Homewood avenue. She was on the crosswalk for pedestrians at the time of the accident. Inman, who was driving north on Greenbay road, claimed that she became confused when she saw his car approaching and turned to go back, then changed her mind, and started forward again. E. Denmark, 603 Central avenue, who witnessed the accident, took Mrs. Hodges to the Highland Park Hospital where her condition was pronounced not serious if complications do not set in. Mrs. E. Brandfeller, 25 South Greenway road, received a broken nose, cuts about the face and body bruises last Saturday afternoon when a car driven by H. P. Stone, Ashbury avenue, Winnetka, struck the car in which she was riding with her husband, the Rev. F. Brandfeller of United Evangelical Church. The accident occurred when Stone who was driving north on Green Bay road, near Ridgewood drive, attempted to pass a car, pulled in, and then apparently skidded into the Brandfeller car which was proceeding south. Both cars had to be towed from the scene of the accident. No one was injured besides Mrs. Brandfeller. On Sunday afternoon, the Buick sedan driven by James Smith of Highland Park, was struck by the Hummobile sedan driven by Luther Johns of Chicago. The accident took place on Sheridan Road near Waverly avenue. Both cars were damaged, but were able to leave the scene under their own power.

Great Activity Not Yet Apparent In Primary Campaigns

Activity on the part of the majority of the candidates for nomination in the city primaries on April 26 seems to be confined to the distribution of campaign cards and personal contacts although a few have used newspaper advertising and some have made public statements. The most spirited campaign at the present seems to be the one conducted by the United Community Campaign Committee which is backing Mrs. Florence Law and Mr. George W. Carr for commissioners and Renalow Sherer for mayor. Both Dr. Bosworth and William Ralph made statements to the Highland Park Press last week and advertisements have appeared for Mr. Joseph W. Taylor who is also using campaign cards and posters in his drive for re-election. Daniel Cobb is another candidate who is making an unusually active primary campaign. He is seeking the nomination for mayor. Of the nineteen candidates, all but one or two have campaign cards in circulation, but comparatively few are as yet conducting what could be regarded as a real fight for nomination. Those who have observed Highland Park politics for a number of years, say it is not unusual for the primary campaign to be rather sluggish in comparison with the fight in the general elections.
