

This Week In Washington

Washington, D. C., Feb. 9.—When the World Court was under discussion it was Senator Borah who occupied the center of the stage. The Court issue has been disposed of, and now the focus of attention is on Senator Carter H. Glass, Democrat, from Virginia.

He is Chairman of the Appropriations Committee which has the \$4,880,000,000 bill under consideration. Notwithstanding the Administration's desire that the bill pass without delay and without amendments, Senator Glass is insisting upon certain provisions being made as to the manner of spending this vast sum. There is even the possibility that he will be able to obtain a reduction in the size of the appropriation.

He is likewise a member of the Committee on Banking and Currency, and on Tuesday, the 5th, the Administration's bank bill was introduced. Ordinarily such a bill would be referred to the sub-committee of which Senator Glass is Chairman, where it has been the custom to refer legislation pertaining to the Federal Reserve System. But inasmuch as the Senator has not been in accord with the Administration's monetary policy and will not concede readily to the Administration's requests in matters of legislation, to prevent the possibility of "Glass amendments" at this writing there is the possibility that the bank bill will be referred to some other sub-committee than that headed by Glass.

The Senator has a long and brilliant career in national affairs. He was elected to the 57th Congress and each succeeding Congress, including the 66th, when he resigned his seat to accept the appointment in 1918 as Secretary of Treasury in the Cabinet of President Wilson. He resigned that position in 1920 in order to qualify as Senator from Virginia, in which capacity he has served ever since. President Roosevelt's invitation to accept the position of Secretary of Treasury in his cabinet was declined. The Senator can be said to be a Democrat of the old school of Jeffersonian Democrats.

The Committee on Rules has under consideration a resolution calling for the investigation of delay, discriminations and irregularities in the Home Owners' Loan Corporation. As someone has said, the committee is "investigating the advisability of investigating."

At the same time Congressman Henry B. Steagall, Democrat, of Alabama, has introduced a bill authorizing an increase in the Corporation's capital in the amount of \$1,500,000,000. Doubtless no final consideration will be given to this measure, and there are many like bills pending, until the question of investigating the Corporation is settled.

Last Friday it was my privilege to be designated to the Committee on Revision of the Laws. It represents the third assignment, now having a seat on the Committee on Patents and on the Committee on Naval Affairs. The last named is a major committee and allows opportunity to keep in close touch with all developments in connection with the naval forces of the United States.

It has been the policy of the Post Office Department to consolidate rural routes wherever possible when a vacancy occurs in a rural carrier position rather than make a new appointment. In order to protect the interests of the patrons out of Lake Villa and Prairie View, a personal call was made at the Post Office Department for a discussion of the matter of a consolidation of these offices.

Hints on How To Get More Heating Comfort

"How can I be more comfortable this winter?" is a question most of us might ask if we thought it would do any good. At the risk of tempting the weatherman to give us even colder weather, the North Shore Gas company volunteers a few suggestions that may make the winter more pleasant.

Some homes are penalized unnecessarily by having insufficient radiation installed. During extremely cold weather, these owners find it virtually impossible to keep the house warm regardless of amount or kind of fuel burned in the furnace. It should be remembered that the actual heating effect depends primarily on the area of radiation surface installed.

Soot on boiler surfaces, however, is a different matter. As an insulation, soot ranks comparatively high. Industrial power plants use built-in soot blowers every day as a means of keeping boilers up to full rating and to save fuel. But cleaning soot out of domestic furnaces is not so convenient. Such unpleasantness can best be avoided by using the cleaner types of fuels. Many users of war air systems

have found that a circulating fan is the secret for greater heating comfort. In any room, air has a tendency to stratify, with warm air in the upper part of the room and the cold air remaining down near the floor. In accordance with modern air conditioning principles, a circulating fan can be used to draw out cold air and replace it with warm air.

Maintenance of proper humidity is another essential for complete comfort. Automatic humidifiers have recently been developed which make a high form of air conditioning practical for many homes.
