A loss sustained by reason of the destruction of property, and not compensated for by insurance, constitutes an allowable deduction unless such damages were caused by the willful act or willful negligence of the taxpayer seeking the deduc-

Interest paid on money borrowed to purchase the automobile is deduc-

All premiums on fire and burglary and similar insurance policies may be deducted covering an automobile used for business purposes.

The items for which deduction may be made on vehicles used for business purposes solely are:

The cost of gasoline, repairs and other operating and maintenance expenses, including depreciation. The latter item is usually figured at 25 per cent per annum of the original purchase price. On cars used partially for business and partially for pleasure, these items can be deducted only to the extent of its use for business purposes. For example, on a car used 25 per cent for business, it is permissible to deduct 25 per cent of the operating, maintenance and depreciation expenses. There is no fixed method of measuring the percentage of use for business and for pleasure, but one accept able method is to use the time, the vehicle is employed for each purpose. Mileage also probably is an

acceptable basis. Insurance premiums; on cars used only partially for business, a proper proportion of this cost may be deducted on the basis outlined above. Motor club dues are deductible as

a business expense only when membership is maintained solely for

business purposes. No deductions are allowed for the money spent in the purchase of an automobile, whether for pleasure or business. This is considered a capital expenditure and, if the vehicle is for business purposes, is subjected to the claim for depreciation noted.




