#### PUBLIC COUNCIL MEETINGS

Meetings of the Highland Park City Council should at all times be open to the public. Regular meetings should be held at the regular stated time. Important matters should not be disposed of in a star chamber session. Full publicity for all council doings.

#### A GREATER HIGHLAND PARK

Recognizing the fact that Highland Park is a rapidly growing city, efforts should be made to provide better parking facilities for our business district. Encourage our citizens and those of neighboring communities to shop here. Repaye main thoroughfares with state aid.

#### ELIMINATE DANGEROUS CROSSINGS

Dangerous railroad crossings such as at Central Avenue, Elm Place, Lincoln Avenue, Roger Williams Avenue, and County Line Road and others can be eliminated, securing, if possible, funds from federal and state departments, and employing local labor and material.

#### ENFORCE CIVIL SERVICE

The people voted for civil service four years ago. This should be enforced so that public employees will not be at the will of politics. Employees should be selected as to qualifications and experience. Pay cuts should be restored as soon as possible.

#### AVOID FACTIONAL FAVORITISM

All elements of our population should receive consideration in selecting public employees. All hiring and appointments by the city should be made without regard to race or party affiliations. We recognize no difference between the interests of local business men, local workmen or commuters.

#### LOWER UTILITY RATES

Our local rates for electricity, gas and telephone are excessive. The city should insist on a lower telephone toll charge between Highland Park and Chicago-as well as to nearby communities. New franchises should be withheld until adjustments are made. The matter should be presented to the Commerce Commission.

#### FEDERAL WORK PROJECTS

The city should join in making application as soon as the federal government starts allocating work projects; for a new post office, new community house, and such other improvements as a survey may disclose necessary. Highland Park has not had its share of federal aid.

#### FREE GARBAGE DISPOSAL

The statute provided that cities the size of Highland Park may have free waste and garbage disposal if proper ordinances are passed. This would assure sanitation at a far less expense than home owners must now endure. Preference can be given to present private facilities in letting of contracts.
