**DEERFIELD CAGE TEAM WINS FROM WAUKEGAN**

**Victory Puts Loal Boys in First Place in the Suburban League**

Playing the game so characteristic of them, the Deerfield heavyweight cagers downed a fast Waukegan team 39 to 33 last Friday evening in the Waukegan gym. This victory gave the Deerfield five an undisputed first place in the Suburban League, as Oak Park was beaten by the six place Morton aggregation.

Warren Dean, second leading scorer in the league, again led the local team to victory by scoring 8 field goals and one free throw for a total of 17 points. He was followed by Charles Osborne with 11 points.

The Deerfield team jumped to a large lead in the opening few minutes and then slowed down letting the Waukegan team come within 2 points of them at the half. With the score 17 to 15 at the opening of the third quarter, McNamara of the Waukegan outfit, sank a field goal tying the score at 17 all. From then on Deerfield put on the pressure and won in fine style.

To offset the heavyweight victory was the lightweight defeat. Playing undoubtedly their worst game of the season the Deerfield ponies were beaten 23 to 15 by a much more aggressive Purple and Gold team. The local ponies are now in fifth place.

On this evening (Thursday) the Deerfield teams will be host to the Morton quintets of Cicero. Morton's heavyweight team, although a sixth place outfit, is still very dangerous. This was proven much to the despair of Oak Park last Friday. Little chance is conceded the local ponies as they were previously beaten by the Cicero outfit.

On Saturday of this week both of the Deerfield fives will travel to Evanston where they take on the Wild Kits. In a previous encounter the local heavies eked out a one point victory while the lights suffered a decisive defeat.

**Gossip of the Stars**

Via the guitar, radio crooning and movie route, Art Jarrett has finally reached the goal marking his greatest ambition... leader of his own orchestra. The handsome, youthful maestro who has been playing at the Blackhawk and over WGN, has traveled a busy and rough road since 1919 when he made his musical debut as soloist at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Brooklyn.

Born of a theatrical family and reared in the atmosphere of the stage, Art has always had a strong leaning toward the world of illusion... more abruptly termed the "show business." His family strongly suspected that he would turn to law when he entered Fordham, but instead, he became tremendously interested in radio and set his footsteps toward possible ether fame.

When he joined Ted Weems in 1927, he had hopes of some day having his own orchestra. Striking upon the distinctive style of singing called "counter-melody singing," he began to attract attention to his vocalizing.

So successful was this style that he was besieged with offers from orchestra leaders who wanted his vocals for their recordings. In all, he has made over 200 records... with orchestras featuring all sorts of sorts of style and rhythm.

As a vocal soloist, after having been with Weems for three and one-half years, and with Earl Burnett for an extended summer engagement, Art was called east where he made a number of guest star appearance over coast-to-coast network shows, and where he made his debut in a Ziegfeld production. Then followed a vaudeville tour across the continent to Hollywood and the movies.

Signed under a long-term contract by MGM, Art appeared in a number of shorts and then was graduate to important singing roles opposite Joan Crawford, Ginger Rogers, Carole Lombard, Norma Shearer and others. Some of the best-known pictures in which he has appeared are "Dancing Lady," "Sitting Pretty," "Let's Fall in Love," and "War Bride."

**A Few of the objects for which Mr. Cobb will work:**

**PROTECTION OF HOMEOWNERS**

To have legal department of city protect homeowners whose property is in distress on account of default in special assessments. Co-operate in adjusting rights for the benefit of both bondholder and property owner.

**CREATE SEPARATE TOWNSHIP**

Seek Special Election to decide whether Highland Park should be made a separate township coinciding with city borders limiting taxpayers' burden to local relief cases and relieving dependent persons from necessity of looking to charitable organizations for relief.

**PUBLIC COUNCIL MEETINGS**

Meetings of the Highland Park City Council should at all times be open to the public. Regular meetings should be held at the regular stated time. Important matters should not be disposed of in a star chamber session. Full publicity for all council doings.

**A GREATER HIGHLAND PARK**

Recognizing the fact that Highland Park is a rapidly growing city, efforts should be made to provide better parking facilities for our business district. Encourage our citizens and those of neighboring communities to shop here. Repave main thoroughfares with state aid.

**ELIMINATE DANGEROUS CROSSINGS**

Dangerous railroad crossings such as at Central Avenue, Elm Place, Lincoln Avenue, Roger Williams Avenue, and County Line Road and others can be eliminated, securing, if possible, funds from federal and state departments, and employing local labor and material.

**ENFORCE CIVIL SERVICE**

The people voted for civil service four years ago. This should be enforced so that public employees will not be at the will of politics. Employees should be selected as to qualifications and experience. Pay cuts should be restored as soon as possible.

**AVOID FACTIONAL FAVORITISM**

All elements of our population should receive consideration in selecting public employees. All hiring and appointments by the city should be made without regard to race or party affiliations. We recognize no difference between the interests of local business men, local workmen or commuters.

**LOWER UTILITY RATES**

Our local rates for electricity, gas and telephone are excessive. The city should insist on a lower telephone toll charge between Highland Park and Chicago—as well as to nearby communities. New franchises should be withheld until adjustments are made. The matter should be presented to the Commerce Commission.

**FEDERAL WORK PROJECTS**

The city should join in making application as soon as the federal government starts allocating work projects; for a new post office, new community house, and such other improvements as a survey may disclose necessary. Highland Park has not had its share of federal aid.

**FREE GARBAGE DISPOSAL**

The statute provided that cities the size of Highland Park may have free waste and garbage disposal if proper ordinances are passed. This would assure sanitation at a far less expense than home owners must now endure. Preference can be given to present private facilities in letting of contracts.

**PLEDGE**

If nominated and elected Mayor, I will work without fear, favor or prejudice—faithfully, honestly and well—in the interests of all.
