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Heavy Vote Recorded In Primary Election

Vote Cast Exceeds Last Primary Vote by 3388; No Contest in Last Primary; Anticipate Even Heavier Vote in April

An unusually heavy vote marked last Tuesday's primary election as one in which the citizens of Highland Park showed far more interest than in any election for many years. Tuesday's total of 3835 votes cast stands far above the totals attained in either of the last two primary elections. In 1927 the total vote was 2890, while in 1931, when there was no contest in the primaries, only 446 votes were cast.

In the mayoralty race Sherer was nominated with 1871 votes, Dooley with 1083, while Cobb was out of the contest with 881.

The eight nominated to run for commissioners are as follows: Law and Carr tied with 1567 votes each. Taylor with 1208, Brown with 1138, Greenslade with 1118, Gourley with 1080, Zimmer with 834 and Ralph with 803.

In the voting for police magistrate both Buell and Schwery were nominated, as there was no contest in the primary. Buell received 1887 and Schwery 1821 votes.

In a statement to the Highland Park Press, Police Chief Ed Moroney said that the election was the usual quiet and orderly affair which Highland Park is accustomed to, no disturbances being reported at any of the polling places.

In spite of, or probably because of, the last-minute attack directed at William Dooley, Renslow Sherer, Florence Law and George Carr, the Sherer ticket piled up more votes than any other three candidates on the ballot. It was common talk on the streets Wednesday morning that without the attack in the "Currier" Daniel Cobb might have had an even chance to beat William Dooley by a small margin.

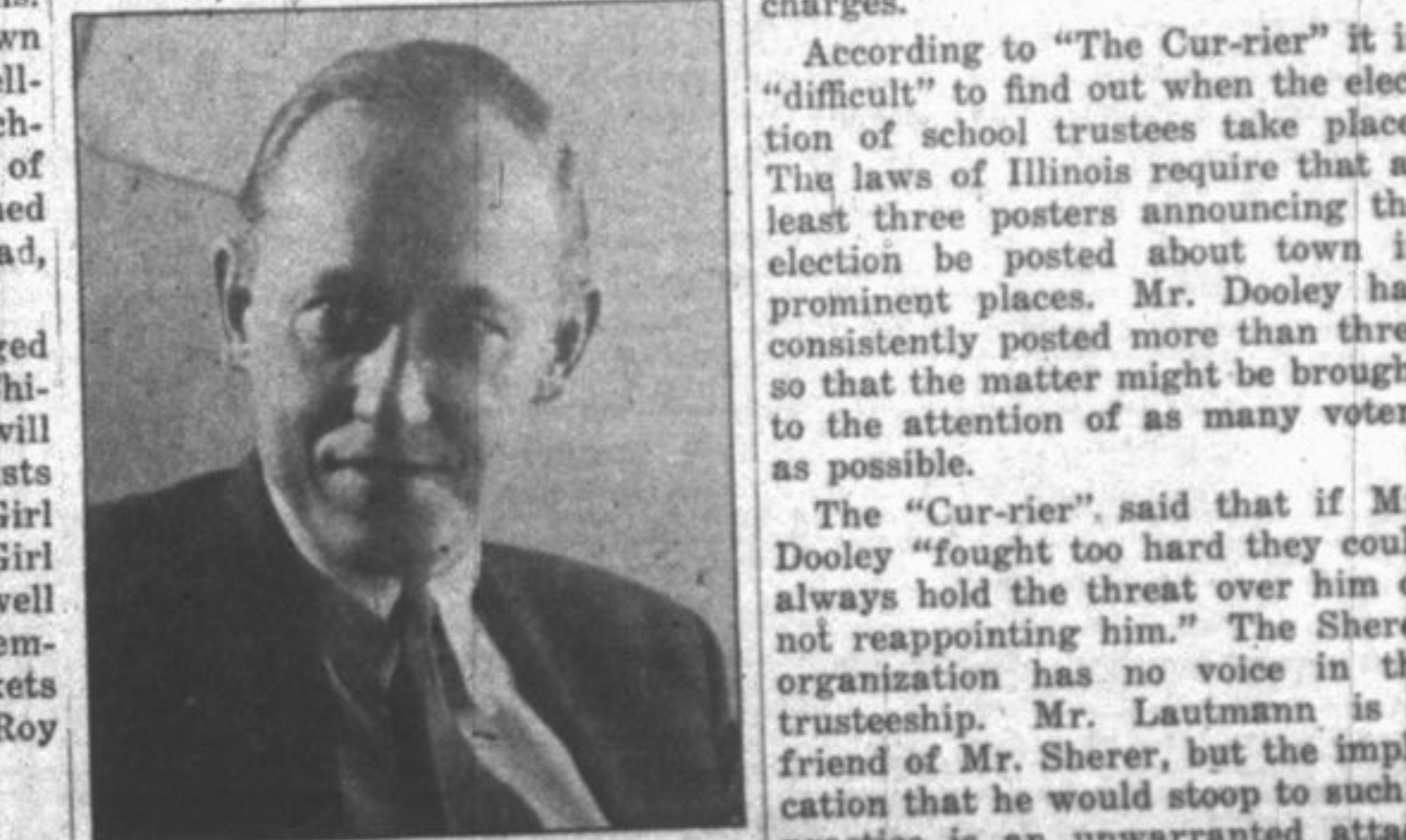
"The Highland Park Currier" Defeats Its Own Ends; Cobb Loses in All Precincts, Even Including His Own

Mr. Hopkins' job of administering the country's vast network of relief is generally conceded to have been subject to the least amount of adverse criticism of any government division despite its tremendous scope.

Starting as division manager of flood relief for the Red Cross in New Orleans in 1923, Mr. Hopkins was subsequently appointed director of the New York relief work, and from there rose to be head of the FERA.

It was the type of book which Mrs. Faxon does well and which her audience was glad to hear, but as it is her policy to vary her program she has decided to do something in a lighter vein for this next program.

The vote last Tuesday definitely established the fact that the effort necessary to attack citizens of the high type of Mr. Sherer, Mr. Sihler, Mr. Dooley, Mr. Berkson, and the many others mentioned in the "publication," is not, in the opinion of local voters, desirable in a candidate for a city office.

The charge that Dooley was "in collusion with the Sherer organization, and the 'reasons' given for the statement are so obviously false that refutation is hardly necessary. However, the following information obtained by the Highland Park Press from Mr. Dooley demonstrates conclusively the absurdity of the charges.

According to "The Currier" it is "difficult" to find out when the election of school trustees take place. The laws of Illinois require that at least three posters announcing the election be posted about town in prominent places. Mr. Dooley has consistently posted more than three so that the matter might be brought to the attention of as many voters as possible.

"The Currier" said that if Mr. Dooley "fought too hard they could always hold the threat over him of not reappointing him." The Sherer organization has no voice in the trusteeship. Mr. Lautmann is a friend of Mr. Sherer, but the implication that he would stoop to such a practice is an unwarranted attack upon the character of a worthy and leading citizen of Highland Park. To imply that either one or the other two trustees, Walter Cope and Peter Duffy, would be a party to such a scheme is equally ridiculous and uncalled for.

Mr. Dooley has held the office of township treasurer since 1912, and has never been criticized for his handling of that position. "The Currier's" statement that he kept funds in "his" bank (he was cashier, he didn't own it) has no weight when the fact is brought out that the banks in which the funds are to be kept are designated by the trustees, and these banks must pass the qualifications set up by the state law!

Mr. Dooley has been required, as treasurer, to post a bond of \$250,000 and has never had any difficulty in securing that bond!

"The Currier" implied that the position of school trustee was a sinecure through its statement that the elections were "back-door elections without publicity." The trustees serve without pay.

"The Currier" stated that a "certain politician" was selected to approach Mr. Dooley to get him to run for mayor.

Mr. Dooley would be very much interested in knowing who that "certain politician" is, as he was approached by a group of his relatives and personal friends who have urged him ever since he was last mayor, to run for the position again.

"The Currier" said that Mr. Dooley promised the job of city clerk to "Rainey" Sheahan. His reply to this statement was brief and to the point: "It's a Lie!"

Another attack, in the form of a charge that an "Inner Clique" is seeking control of all offices in Highland Park is certainly a poor reward for people who have given their time and money to worthy causes in Highland Park without desire for or expectation of any financial recompense. The charges that they are doing this philanthropic civic work only to "create jobs" for their friends (with the inference that they would get a "split") could come only from those incapable of realizing the true significance of the words "public service."

The men and women mentioned in this group have consistently proven themselves a definite force for good in Highland Park and any charge that they are self-seeking is so uncalled for that were it not for its gross injustice, would be a subject for laughter rather than scorn.
