

Council's Resolution Provides for Election

Mayor, Four Commissioners, Police Magistrate To Be Elected; Liquor Proposition Also To Be Submitted at Election on April 16

A vote on the liquor question as well as the election of a mayor, four commissioners and a police magistrate is included in the resolution providing for a general city election on April 16, passed by the Highland Park City Council last Monday evening.

The vote on the liquor question is restricted, in that the only proposition to be put upon the ballot is "Shall the sale at retail, of alcoholic liquor be prohibited in this city?" It is again pointed out that in voting on this question, "no" means "yes" and "yes" means "no." A vote of "no" means that the sale of liquor shall NOT be prohibited, that liquor SHALL be sold, while a vote of "yes" means that the sale of liquor SHALL be prohibited, that liquor shall NOT be sold.

The resolution also provides for the appointment of judges and clerk of election in Highland Park's 11 precincts.

Deerfield Track Team Takes Third Place In New Trier Meet

Running in a triangular meet marked by the shattering of the New Trier fieldhouse record for the mile run, the Deerfield-Shields senior trackteam placed third Saturday, against the New Trier and Hammond high school trackteams.

New Trier's strong team pulled away from its other two rivals and set up a winning total of 73 1/2 points. Hammond finished second with 19 points, and Deerfield was third with 14 1/2 points.

N. York, a Hammond distance man, set a new fieldhouse record for the mile run. His time was 4:45.2, .038 under the old mark tied by "Stride" McClory, last year. York also won the half mile with a time of 2:08.1.

Local stars who showed were: "Stride" McClory and "Amby" Cantagallo who placed third and fourth respectively, in the mile run, "Duck" Glader who was third in the fast half mile with a time of 2:08.7, Tom Irving who threw the shot 47 ft. 10 inches to place second in the shot put, "Beau" Pasquesi took fourth place in the quarter mile, Jim Kennedy broadjumped 20 ft. 2 inches placing third, and Harry Lankford and Bill Crawford who both jumped 5 ft. 6 inches to tie for fourth place in the highjump. Bill Crawford also placed fourth in the low hurdles.

The Fresh-Soph team made a good

showing finishing second with a total of 23 1/2 points. This team is considered to be one of the best to come to Deerfield-Shields in recent years.

Deerfield-Shields will participate in the annual Suburban meet, Saturday at the Oak Park fieldhouse at 2 p.m.

Denies Affiliation With Square Deal Ticket of Highwood

PRESS SELLS OUT ON NEWSSTANDS

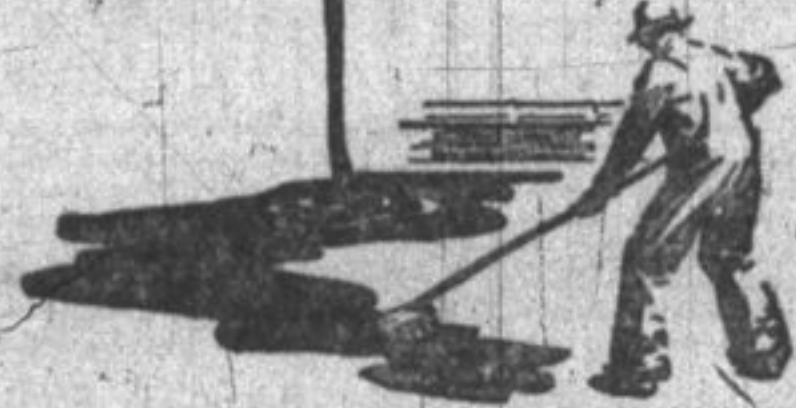
