

# Deerfield Loses in Overtime Game

## New Trier Wins Out by One Point in Tournament Battle Saturday

Losing an overtime game 23-21 to New Trier last Saturday evening the Deerfield-Shields heavyweight quintet was deprived of the Northwest District basketball title. After jumping to a 16-5 lead at half-time the Highland Parkers came back to score only three points in the final half, while an inspired New Trier five rolled up 14 to tie the score at 19 all. Then in the overtime Moseley, stellar Blue and White guard, sank a side shot to give his team a 2-point lead. However, within thirty seconds the Green and Grey team retaliated with four points, thereby winning the game.

Statistically the local team was the outstanding team of the tournament. In four games they scored 145 points while New Trier scored only 87. Deerfield also set the high score of the week when they beat Antioch 55 to 24 on Tuesday, the first night of tournament play. And the following Thursday they downed Maine high to the tune of 44 to 24. In the semi-finals Friday evening the Highland Parkers came back in the final quarter to win a close 25-24 contest from Waukegan. Then in the finals New Trier, the dark horse of the tournament, upset the dope in the most heart-breaking defeat of the season.

Coach Thurston's boys were blessed with bad luck at the start of the tournament: Warren Dean, second high scorer in league play, received a broken wrist in the Maine game and was unable to play after that. His loss was most disheartening and only a team of the calibre of the Deerfield team could go on to play in the finals.

Shelton, substitute center, was undoubtedly the outstanding player in the tournament while Elmer Maiman, Deerfield's great defensive guard was right behind him. Shelton, with 35 points won the high scoring honor of the tournament while Hansen, Deerfield forward, followed with 34. When the all-District teams were picked Shelton's and Maiman's names appeared in the first string line-up while Hansen and Moseley were picked on the second team.

Tonight the Blue and White five will take on Elgin in the first game of sectional play at New Trier. The finalists of this tournament will travel to Champaign to play for the state title. Due to their loss at the hands of New Trier last week the Highland Parkers will be the under dog.

## Deerfield Finishes Fourth in Suburban League Track Meet

The Deerfield senior track team placed fourth in the sixth annual Suburban League track and field tourney held Saturday at the Oak Park fieldhouse. Oak Park took first place in both senior and junior divisions.

Oak Park piled up five firsts to win the meet with a total of 45 points. Evanston finished second with 36, New Trier third with 18, Deerfield fourth with 10, Proviso fifth with 5, and Marton was last with 3 points.

In the senior field events Bill Faymonville, of New Trier, broke his old league shot put record of 50 feet 2 inches. He established a new shot put record of 52 feet 11 inches. Dan Canham of Oak Park broke the high jump record when he cleared the bar at 5 feet 11 1/2 inches. The old league record was 5 feet 10 1/2 inches.

"Stride" McClory of Deerfield, again came through in the mile run to finish a very close second. He was tossed out of first place by Williams, an Oak Park man. McClory was closely followed by "Amby" Cantagallo, who placed third. The winner's time for the mile was 4:47.9. Tom Irving, competing against Faymonville, took third in the shot put with a throw of 46 feet 9 inches. Bill Crawford hurled in to fourth place in the 60 yard high hurdles. The relay team, composed of Brown, Matson, Boehm, and Pasquasi, placed third.

## Bird Hikes Begin Tuesday, March 19

Because of the popularity of bird hikes, and the numerous requests for them, Community Service will again sponsor a series of bird and nature study hikes here in Highland Park, beginning March 19.

For the last four years these bird walks over very interesting country have been very popular, and well attended by people of all ages.

To be a bird hiker and really enjoy the out-of-doors of an early morning two things are necessary: first, a real interest in the out-of-doors; and second, a desire to learn more about those interesting, colorful, and musical neighbors — the birds.

Bert S. Leech, of the natural science department of the Elm Place School, will again lead the morning hunts for birds. Mr. Leech has behind him many interesting years of experience in this field and you may be sure that his informal talks about nature will be an experience not to be forgotten, we are told.

The time to start studying birds is now; for the birds are beginning to return to Highland Park. Mr. Leech says that an early start is desirable, that one can become acquainted with the various species as they arrive, and much needless confusion is avoided.

Six o'clock in the morning is the starting time for bird walks, weather permitting. The walk begins at Sunset Park. Hikers are asked to assemble just west of the fieldhouse. They are asked to bring field glasses as they help make the trip more interesting, and to wear boots or galoshes to keep feet dry.

These walks are free, being part of the community recreation program of Community Service.

Arrangements are now being made by the Community Service staff for an even bigger and better tournament than last year. ## MAT STARS PREPARE FOR C.A.A.U. BOUTS

The Central Amateur Athletic Union Wrestling Championship tournament will be held in the 132nd Armory, Madison and Rockwell streets on Friday and Saturday nights, March 29 and 30, under the auspices of the Interfraternity club.

The meet will decide the amateur championships in the C.A.A.U. district of Illinois and Wisconsin. Any amateur athlete within that district is eligible to participate in the tournament.

Champions will be crowned in nine classes — 112; 118; 126; 135; 145; 155; 165; 175 and heavyweight.

Among the institutions entering full teams are the University of Illinois, University of Chicago, University of Wisconsin, Wheaton College, Armour Institute, Marquette university, Swedish-American Athletic club, Norwegian-American A.A., Jewish Organization and the Catholic Youth Organization.

In addition, the Chicago Park district will enter more than 100 wrestlers. Mat stars from the University of Indiana, the University of Iowa and Cornell college at Mount Vernon, Iowa, who live in the C.A.A.U. district are also expected to enter.

Part of the net receipts will go toward sending the American Olympic team to Berlin in the summer of 1936. Girls of the Junior league will also sell tickets, a part of the proceeds going toward their favorite charity.

## Local Dog Owners Enter Pets in Chicago Kennel Club Show

Suburban dog fanciers will play an important part in the 34th annual all-breed show of the Chicago Kennel Club to be held in the Coliseum, Chicago, March 29, 30 and 31, it is stated by Alexander H. Stewart of Highland Park and Barrington, president of the club. Approximately \$10,000 worth of prizes will be given.

Last year some 700 pedigreed dogs were entered by suburban breeders and individuals who have pedigreed dogs for pets and this year should see nearly 1,000 canine blue-bloods from the suburbs fighting for the class and grand championships, Mr. Stewart said. Entries are being received at the Kennel Club offices at No. 5 North Wabash Avenue.

The bench show committee this year is composed of Thomas M. Howell of Barrington, George D. Henneberry and Mr. Stewart.

Boys and girls from the ages of 10 to 16 will have an opportunity to demonstrate their ability in handling dogs in the ring. This is the first time in the history of the club that a children's class has been added to the annual dog classic.
