**Consumer's Corner**

Hearings on Senator Copeland's bill (S-5) to change the present Food and Drug act were begun on March 2 in a sub-committee of the Senate Commerce Committee. The new Copeland Bill strengthens the present Food and Drug Law passed in 1906 and adapts it to meet changed conditions. It includes most of the important points of S-1944 the first Copeland bill last year which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in its annual report for 1933.

The present bill which is being discussed in committee is designed to strengthen the existing Food and Drug act by: (1) Prohibiting false advertising as well as false labeling; (2) requiring positive information upon labels as well as prohibiting false information; (3) bringing cosmetics under regulation and reducing drugs and mechanical devices as well as medicine for disease; and (4) providing for a more vigorous method of enforcement.

False advertising of food drugs and cosmetics is prohibited "if in every particular representations are not sustained by demonstrable scientific fact or substantial medical opinion." The bill also declares it unlawful to advertise for sale a drug represented to have therapeutic effect in the treatment of cancer, tuberculosis, venereal disease, and heart disease unless the advertisements are disseminated only to the medical profession. The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to add to the list after he has submitted recommendations to a committee on Public Health provided for in the bill. "Advertising" is considered any and all forms of advertising where as in the law at present in effect it applies only to the labels of Food and Drugs.

Other provisions of the bill will be discussed in later articles as well as other bills which have been introduced on the same subjects. Consumers of foods and drugs which means, of course, every one, should know all about the proposals which are being considered for their protection.—Lake County Consumers Council.

Probably no play in recent years has created as much discussion as "The First Legion," the comedy romance of Faith which began a limited engagement at the Harris theatre, Chicago, on Monday evening, March 4th.

**Model House Exhibit**  
Miss Kerfoot is well known in this community for the work she has accomplished. In regard to her work she says, "The construction of a model home and its landscaping is the high light of the art appreciation class. The plan of the house is scaled and drawn, the house constructed, and a detailed blue print of the garden plan worked out before the actual landscaping is done. Various gardens are planned to be suitable for the different types of home architecture. Flower and seed catalogs are consulted for planting hints, and current magazines and books containing drawings of garden plans are studied.

"The interest shown in this project is very great. The students are encouraged in their work by various contests which they enter. For the last three years their houses and gardens have been displayed at the Illinois Flower show and won various awards. Last year, the projects were entered in the Century of Progress miniature home contest sponsored by the American Society of Florists. Miss Eileen Sullivan, one of the students, won second place with an award of \$40.00.

Approximately two months of the school year is spent on this unit of the course and it is without doubt the most interesting phase of the course as planned. A keen interest is developed among the students in designing and planning a home and landscaping the surrounding ground."

**Birds the Year 'Round**  
In his illustrated lecture, "Birds the Year 'Round," Mr. Leech says, "Birds and interests arising from a study of them, are of no particular time or season. They are here in varying numbers throughout the year.

"The migratory birds that come in the spring to former nesting sites or pass through on their way north, seeking new or former homes, present to us the greatest spectacle; because of their countless numbers.

"Those that remain throughout the year, though fewer in number, hold our interest because of the bareness of the landscape in winter, and because of the brave struggle they make against the weather. It is these that need our attention and help most.

The planting of shrubs that hold their fruit in winter, evergreens and vines for shelter, and the erection of feeding stations, are a few of the attentions we can give them.
