

PLAYERS GO ON NEW SCHEDULE THIS YEAR

Discard Old Policy of Giving One Three-Act Play; Offer Variety

Discarding a policy of five years' standing, the Ravinia Players will present a bill of four one-act plays in place of a three-act play, as the third production of the season on Friday, April 5, at the Ravinia Village House.

The program to be presented next month contains three comedies of entirely different types, ranging from Oscar Wolfe's local comedy of people trying to decide whether or not to build a home in Highland Park, through Lord Dunsany's "A Lost Silk Hat," to Thornton Wilder's "Queen of France," a story of court intrigue in New Orleans. The remaining play on the program is Edna St. Vincent Millay's fantasy, "Aria da Capo," a harlequinade with a tragic interlude.

Each of these plays has a separate director, and a separate cast, with very few cases of a person having part in more than one play. The cast contains several faces which are thoroughly familiar to the group's audiences from other shows this season, and a few which are completely new.

The entire cast of "Where But in America" falls in the first of these categories, consisting of Gertrude Williams Butler, Ted Osborn, and Ellen Truax.

"The Lost Silk Hat" brings to the Players two of the members of the old Ravinia Drama Workshop, Dr. Harry Barackman and Godfrey Eiler. The performance of this play is almost in the nature of a revival, as it was one of the outstanding successes of the Workshop. Dr. Barackman is directing the play as well as acting in it, and the cast is completed by two actors well known to the audiences of the Players, Bob Arnold and Bill Stieglitz.

Enid Phillips, who has played leading roles with the Players for four seasons, is deserting the ranks of the actors, in order to direct "Queens of France." Her cast is composed of Karl Berning, who made his local debut earlier this season in "The Dark Tower," Josie Buhl, Jane Wood, and Jeanne Smith.

The cast of Aria da Capo, which is being directed by Bill Stieglitz, includes Laura Browning and Karl Berning who play Columbine and Pierrot, while Dr. Barackman is Cothurnus, the masque of tragedy, and Enid Phillips and Felicite Buhl are Thyrsis and Corydon, two shepherds.



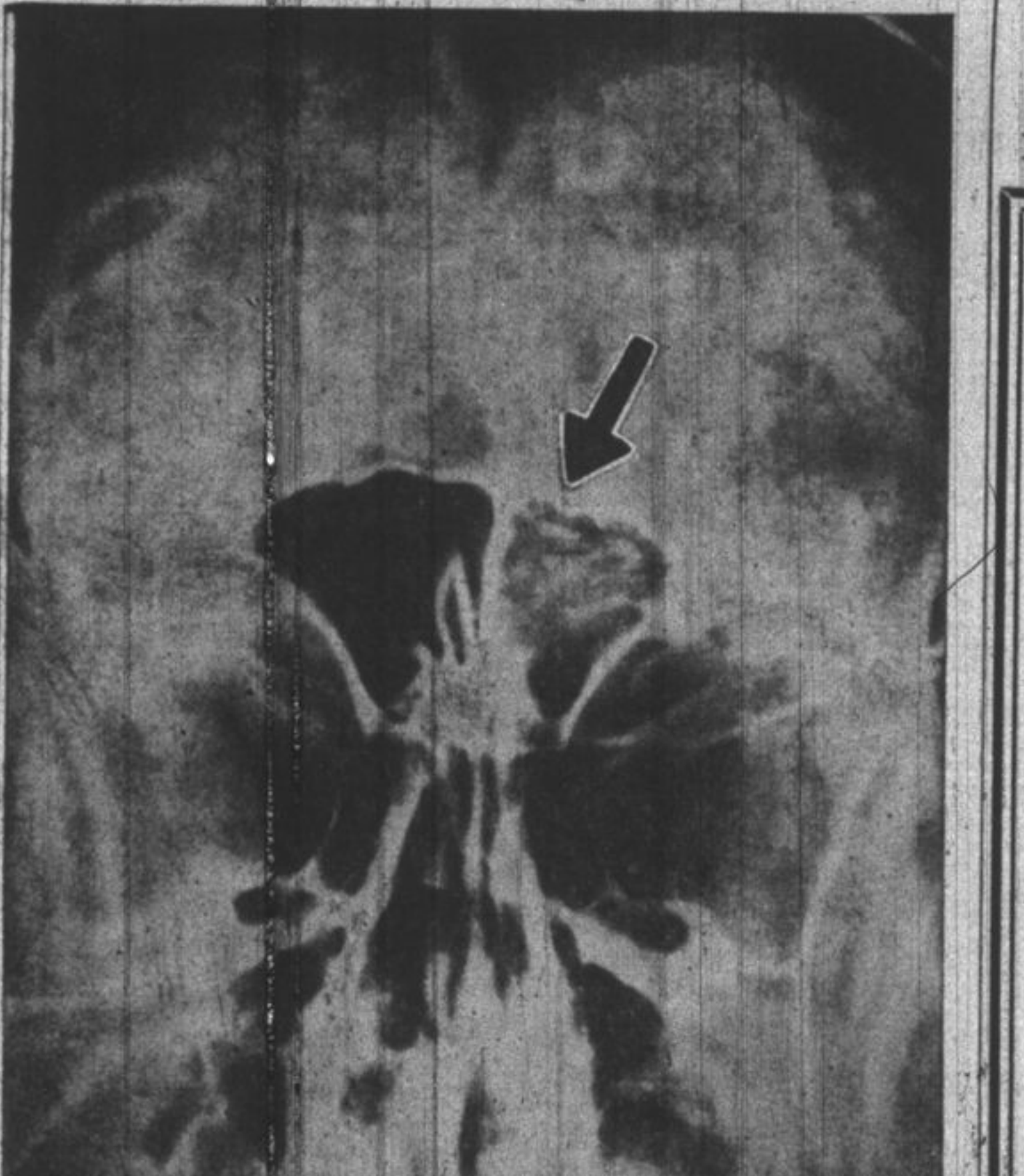
