## Town Meeting Recessed Until Friday Evening

### Committee Selected To Receive Communications from Relief Authorities and To Consider Report of Township Supervisor.

Elected of Deerfield Township appointed a committee to receive the reports from the Illinois and Lake County Emergency Relief Committees and to consider the annual report of the township supervisor, William J. Obee, at the town meeting, held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Members of the committee are F. J. Ronan, R. P. Sherer, Mrs. Benjamin Lewis, Mrs. Claude Wampler, Mrs. Jay Glidden, John Oliver, Roland Stanley, Albert Lyle, Sam Pasquesi, Charles F. Baker, Mrs. George Brown and J. D. Garrity. The committee will report its findings and recommendations to the recessed town meeting on Friday, April 5, at 8 p.m. in the Elm Place School auditorium.

At the early meeting, held at 8:15 a.m. in the township hall, Arthur Swanson was elected moderator. In the absence of Albert Larson, town clerk, Mrs. Hilda Gitlin was appointed clerk.

At the afternoon meeting, Philip Cole, member of the Lake County Relief Commission, explained that due to the fact that welfare cases, consisting of unemployables, will be returned to township relief, it will be necessary to increase the town levy for 1935. Levies for the past four years have been as follows: 1931, \$40,000; 1932, \$50,000; 1933, \$50,000; 1934, \$50,000. Because of the increased burden which will be put on the township this year, it is felt that a levy of \$75,000 for poor relief will be necessary. As \$25,000 will also be needed for administration of veteran's relief under the Bogardus Act, and \$10,000 for general township expenses, it appears that the township must levy \$110,000 this year.

The only other business brought up at this meeting, was a request made by Arthur Swanson that the committee consider increasing the fee of the town auditors from \$1.50 to \$5.00 per meeting.

## Employment Agency Fills 353 Positions

Since June, 1934, the Central Employment Agency, formerly known as "Fred's" has filled 353 positions for its patrons. Of this number, 275 were women, 27 men and 56 were couples. Salaries paid on the positions secured ranged from \$5 to \$18 per week for women, \$10 to \$15 per week for men, and from \$50 to \$125 per month for couples.

H. E. Alsup, who took over the business in June, has a long record as a school teacher and personnel worker. He taught in high schools in Missouri, Kansas, and Iowa, and also in private schools in Oklahoma, Iowa, and Missouri. He also headed the commercial department of the State Teachers' College at Aberdeen, S.D. Mr. Alsup has also had experience as an insurance advisor and as a personnel worker in the Chicago Unemployment Relief service.

## Harmony Ticket Wins in Township Election

### William Steele, William Witten and Emmett Moroney Elected To Township Offices; Opposition Carries Only Four Precincts

## STEELE, WITT ELECTED PARK COMMISSIONERS

Clarence Witt and Edward Steele were the successful candidates for the office of commissioners on the East Park Board in the election held last Tuesday. Witt was high man with 1263 votes, followed by Steele with 1188.

The complete vote was cast as follows:

Although the vote was rather light in comparison with that cast in the township election, it was unusually heavy for a Park District contest. In the past, it has not been unusual for 50 votes to elect a commissioner. It is probable that an even larger vote would have been cast were it not for the fact that polling places for the two elections were different and many people having voted in one election, neglected to take the trouble of going to another polling place to vote in another one.

It is hoped that the heavy vote is an indication that the lethargy of a large group of Highland Park residents, who, in the past, have seldom taken the trouble to vote, is a thing of the past and that the city, as a unit, will take a constructive interest in its affairs.

## Appoint Membership Committee for New Recreation Club

A group of Highland Park people, interested in bowling, billiards, and other indoor sports, met at the city hall Friday evening, March 22, to establish a recreation room where the above mentioned activities may be enjoyed.

The former Chevrolet garage on North Second Street is available and proposed as an ideal building. A long term lease may be had and the rent is reasonable enough to assure success to the venture.

Remodeling the building would accommodate on the first floor eight regulation bowling alleys, a gallery for spectators, soda fountain, and lockers. The second floor could care for billiard and pool tables, table tennis, badminton, golf driving net and other sports equipment.

The following plans were adopted: First, that such a recreation room must be of the highest type possible catering only to those who may be relied upon to conduct themselves properly at all times.

Second, that it will be organized in the nature of a club with guest card privileges for non-members.

Third, that it will be financed by the sale of equity memberships at \$10 each, any subscriber having the privilege of purchasing more than one membership, and each membership to participate in the net earnings of the club.

A meeting of the membership committee will be held Friday evening, April 15, in the editor's office of the Highland Park Press.

The four precincts carried by the Obee ticket were the first, located in Lake Forest, and second and third, which are in Highwood, and the ninth in Highland Park. What might be considered an outstanding surprise in the returns is the fact that the Harmony ticket won in the tenth which is Obee's home precinct. In this precinct, Steele won by nine votes, his two running mates also winning by small majorities.

In a joint statement to the Highland Park Press, the successful candidates stated that they wish to thank the citizens of the township for their loyal support and pledge themselves to work wholeheartedly for the good of the township.
