At the afternoon meeting, Philip Cole, member of the Lake County Relief Commission, explained that due to the fact that welfare cases, consisting of unemployables, will be returned to township relief, it will be necessary to increase the town levy for 1935. Levies for the past four years have been as follows: 1931, \$40,000; 1932, \$50,000; 1933 \$50,000; 1934, \$50,000. Because of the increased burden which will be put on the township this year, it felt that a levy of \$75,000 for poor relief will be necessary.
