START ORGANIZATION OF COMMUNITY CLUB

Results of the Opening Sale of Membership Proves to Be Very Encouraging

Great enthusiasm has marked the opening of the membership sale for the proposed Community Recreational club for Highland Park. With less than a week of actual signing up for memberships in the club and with only four of the membership committee having turned in their lists of promised members, nearly one hundred have already signified their willingness to back the enterprise.

For many years those interested in a recreational club of high character, as well as those primarily concerned with social planning, have recognized the need for an organization of this kind, but until the present sponsors undertook the proposition, nothing definite has been accomplished.

Organize Community Council in Highland Park

One week ago there was created in this city an organization designed to aid the citizens in civic, municipal and political matters, based on the broadest consideration of the needs of the whole community as a governmental and social unit.

This development known as "The Community Council," is the outgrowth of a series of inquiries into the civic conditions and needs set in motion by the "Paul Revere" local chapter, the patriotic society.

Membership in the Community Council is open to all citizens regardless of political or religious affiliations upon invitation and sponsorship by a member. There are no dues, such funds as may be required will be secured by small voluntary contributions from time to time.

The requirements for admission are that the applicant must be a voter; not holding public office, nor a candidate for office. Membership is open to both men and women.

The Community Council will hold public meetings presided over by the chairman, who together with an Advisory committee and a secretary-treasurer will constitute the executive body and administration. (Continued on Page Three)

Mayor, Four Commissioners, and Police Magistrate to Be Elected on Next Tuesday; Liquor Question to Be Settled

TAX BILLS PAYABLE AT H. P. STATE BANK

The tax bills for the year 1934 have just been mailed out by County Treasurer Allen J. Nelson. Under arrangements made by him, taxes may be paid at the Highland Park State Bank.

The bills that have been mailed out cover the first and second installments, or the total amount of the taxes due. If the payer elects to pay only the first installment, it is his privilege.

It is noted on the statements that a penalty will be added after May 1. The penalty consists of advertising cost and interest at the rate of one per cent per month. Tax sale begins the second Monday in October.

Township Increases Its Poor Relief Levies

The regular town meeting of the township of Deerfield, which was carried over from Tuesday, April 2, was resumed Friday night, April 5, at the Elm Place School.

Arthur Swanson, who was elected moderator on Tuesday, called the meeting to order at 8 p.m. After considerable discussion it was decided to accept the report of Supervisor Obee, as the committee of 12 named on Tuesday felt that the report should be accepted as submitted.

The tax levy on the township was increased by \$25,000, the entire amount to be used for the poor fund. For the past four years the amount levied for the poor has never exceeded \$50,000, but because many welfare cases must be returned to the township relief, the additional \$25,000 was believed to be necessary.

The total amounts levied were: \$75,000 for poor relief, \$25,000 for veterans' relief under the Bogardus Act, and \$10,000 for general expenses. In order to raise the total amount of the levy, \$110,000, taxpayers will be assessed approximately 67 or 68 cents on each \$100 valuation.

Several resolutions were passed. One was that the supervisor should avail himself of the facilities of the Highland Park Social Service in distributing relief. In the same resolution, it was suggested that some consideration be given to hiring a trained social worker to investigate cases on relief.

Another resolution was passed suggesting that the newly elected supervisor, William W. Steele, engage competent counsel to investigate the back bills that the county board claims against the township of Deerfield.

Annual Meeting of Women Voters to Be Held on Wednesday

The annual meeting of the local League of Women Voters which will take place Wednesday, April 17, at 10:30 a.m., at the YWCA promises to be an unusually interesting one. The morning session will be occupied with the reports of the officers and committee chairmen, when the varied activities of the committees will be presented.

The usual luncheon will take place at 12 o'clock, and an interesting program will be given at 1 o'clock. Because of the general interest of the subject to be presented, and the fact that those who will take part are Northwestern students, the local high school students are cordially invited to attend, and are assured a vital presentation of a most important matter to the youth of the country.

A mayor, four commissioners and a police magistrate, all to serve a four year term, will be elected at Highland Park's general election on next Tuesday, April 16. In addition to the election of officials, the question of Highland Park's future status in regard to the liquor question will not be possible to bring the question up again until the next general election, four years hence.

Following are candidates for election: for mayor, William Dooley and R. P. Sherer; for commissioners W. J. Brown, G. W. Carr, Lyle Gourley, Robert Greenslade, Mrs. Florence Law, William Ralph Jr., Joseph Taylor, and Julius Zimmer; for police magistrate, Charles Buell and Herman Schwery.

The first candidate mentioned, William Dooley, has already served Highland Park as mayor, and as a postmaster. He states that as a retired business man he would be able to devote the necessary time to the office. He also states that his many years of residence here have given him a thorough insight into the needs of Highland Park. Mr. Dooley pledges himself to uphold the efficiency of Highland Park's present police and fire departments.

R. P. Sherer, who is opposing Mr. Dooley as a candidate for mayor, is a graduate of the University of Chicago, and is an official of the Sherer-Gillett Company, manufacturers of display equipment. Mr. Sherer has been a resident of Highland Park for eight years, is a member (Continued on Page 5)

School Board Election To Be Held Saturday

Howell W. Murray, president of the board, and Dr. Gatewood and Mrs. Margaret McPherson are unopposed for re-election to their respective offices in School District No. 107 next Saturday, April 13. The board members are elected for a three-year term, but the president serves only one year. Elm Place School will be the polling place. Polls will be open from noon to 7 p.m.

There is no opposition to candidates in District 108, which includes Lincoln, Ravina, Braeside and the Ridge schools; Robert L. Grinnell is running for re-election as president of the board, while John B. Jackson and Frank L. Venning are candidates to succeed George W. Carr and D. M. Blasier as members of the board. The district 108 election also takes place next Saturday.

George T. Rogers is also unopposed as a candidate for president of the Deerfield-Shields High School Board of Education. The high school election will also be held Saturday.

Relief Commission Denies Election Rumor

The Lake County Committee of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, having been informed of rumors to the effect that the election of anyone to a public office might or might not affect the standing of a client on relief, either direct or work relief, wishes to go on record that it is not at all interested in the politics of the county or the various townships and cities, and irrespective of who is elected, no change is contemplated as long as funds are available. ELECTION OF SCHOOL TRUSTEE SATURDAY

Herbert Lautmann Unopposed For Re-election to Office as School Trustee

Herbert M. Lautmann will run for re-election as one of the three members of the board of township school trustees, next Saturday, April 13, at the State Bank building in Highland Park. The poll will be open from 3 to 6 p.m. There is no other candidate.

This board has charge of school districts, 106, 107, 108, 109, 110, 111, 112, and 113. This includes the Deerfield-Shields Township High School. Board members hold title to school property, appoint the school treasurer and audit his accounts. Only one member is to be elected at this time. Election of one member to serve for six years takes place every two years. The other two present members of the board are Peter Duffy of Deerfield, and Walter Cope of Highland Park.
