ber of the American Legion, president of the Highland Park Hospital Association, and from 1932 to 1934 was chairman of the Citizens' Advisory Committee. He was chairman of a citizen's committee which conducted the Deerfield Township investigation and is a member of the Lake County Board of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission. He is married and has two children.

Mr. Sherer, George Carr and Mrs. Florence Law, who are running for election on the United Community Ticket, promise the following in their campaign platform:

- (1) To give an honest, efficient administration for the common good of property owner, business man and resident and to endeavor to reduce taxes;
- (2) To preserve Highland Park as a residential community and to clarify and enforce the zoning laws;
- (3) To seek and use effectively, Federal funds for Highland Park in order to create local employment and in regard to this matter, to co-operate with other North Shore suburbs in attempting to secure the depression of the railroad tracks;
- (4) To investigate the possibilities of a reduction in water and utility rates and to study the best method of garbage disposal;
- (5) To maintain the efficiency of the police and fire departments and to stimulate public interest in co-operating in safety and fire prevention measures;
- (6) To endeavor to protect the property interest of all concerned in the matter of special assessments with due regard to present conditions;
- (7) To encourage citizens to become familiar with the city's problems by attending council meetings and participating in the work by serving on special committees for which their talents fit them;
- (8) To publish at intervals a statement of the city's activities and finances, and in general, to develop a community spirit for the improvement of the entire city.

William J. Brown, candidate for commissioner, served in that capacity from 1927 to 1931. In the general election in 1931 he tied for fourth place with Julius Zimmer and lost the coin toss to see who would take office. He has been a resident of Highland Park and building contractor here for many years.

George W. Carr, candidate for commissioner, has been a resident of Highland Park for 27 years. He is married and has two children. Mr. Carr studied engineering and architecture at Armour Institute and abroad; is a member of the Ameri-

can Institute of Engineers, and was one of the four building commissioners of the Century of Progress. He is a member of District 108 school board, a member of the zoning board, the American Legion, and was a captain in the U. S. Army during the world war.

Lyle Gourley, candidate for commissioner, has served three terms in that office. During his terms of office he has been in charge of public property and accounts and finances.

Robert Greenslade, candidate for re-election as commissioner, is completing his first term in that office. During the past four years he has been in charge of the water department in Highland Park.
