

### Deerfield Assists in Evangelical Conclave

With the Illinois Conference of the Evangelical denomination drawing near, homes of Highland Park and Deerfield are making preparation to welcome two hundred visiting clergy and lay delegates from all over the state. On April 23, the conclave will open at Bethany Church in Highland Park and be concluded the following Sunday, April 28, with a service in the Deerfield-Shields High School auditorium.

Several men of note will be here for this gathering, among them Bishop G. E. Epp of this denomination and Dr. Herbert Willett, who is well known in church circles. Bishop Epp will attend the entire session, while Dr. Willett will come for the special services on Friday afternoon and evening, April 26, as the speaker. Rev. Heck, general secretary of religious education of the Evangelical Church, will also attend the conference.

The outstanding services of this conclave will be the Wednesday afternoon session, at which time district superintendents are elected. The Deerfield choir will sing during the evening session on that day. The annual Memorial service will be held Tuesday afternoon, following the communion service.

On Sunday afternoon, April 28, the conference will be closed with a meeting that attracts laymen from near and far. It will begin at 2:30 o'clock and is to be held in the high school auditorium and two thousand persons are expected to attend. At this time Rev. F. A. Rander, pastor at Ottawa, will be guest preacher in Deerfield in the morning service.

The ladies of the Deerfield church will be hostesses to the convention all day Thursday and on Sunday evening.

Forty-five of the two hundred delegates will be housed in Deerfield during conference week.

### Deerfield Youths Study Courtship Book

Last Thursday evening a group of young people met with Rev. E. J. Bruso in the Bethlehem Church in Deerfield for the first discussion on marriage. Roy Burkhart's book "Thinking About Marriage" is to be used as the text and any youth above eighteen years of age is invited.

### Change Ordered in U. S. Route Numbers

SPRINGFIELD, April 5—An interchange of Route numbers between U.S. 45 and Illinois 54 in the northern part of Lake county has been ordered by Chief Highway Engineer, Ernst Lieberman. Route U.S. 45 through Grayslake, Lake Villa and Astioch, will become Illinois 54. Former Route 54 through Milburn and Hickory Corners will be U.S. 45. This change was necessary in order to meet the markings of U.S. 45 at the Wisconsin State line and was recommended by the Executive committee of the American Association of State Highway officials, who are vested with the authority of locating all U. S. marked highways.

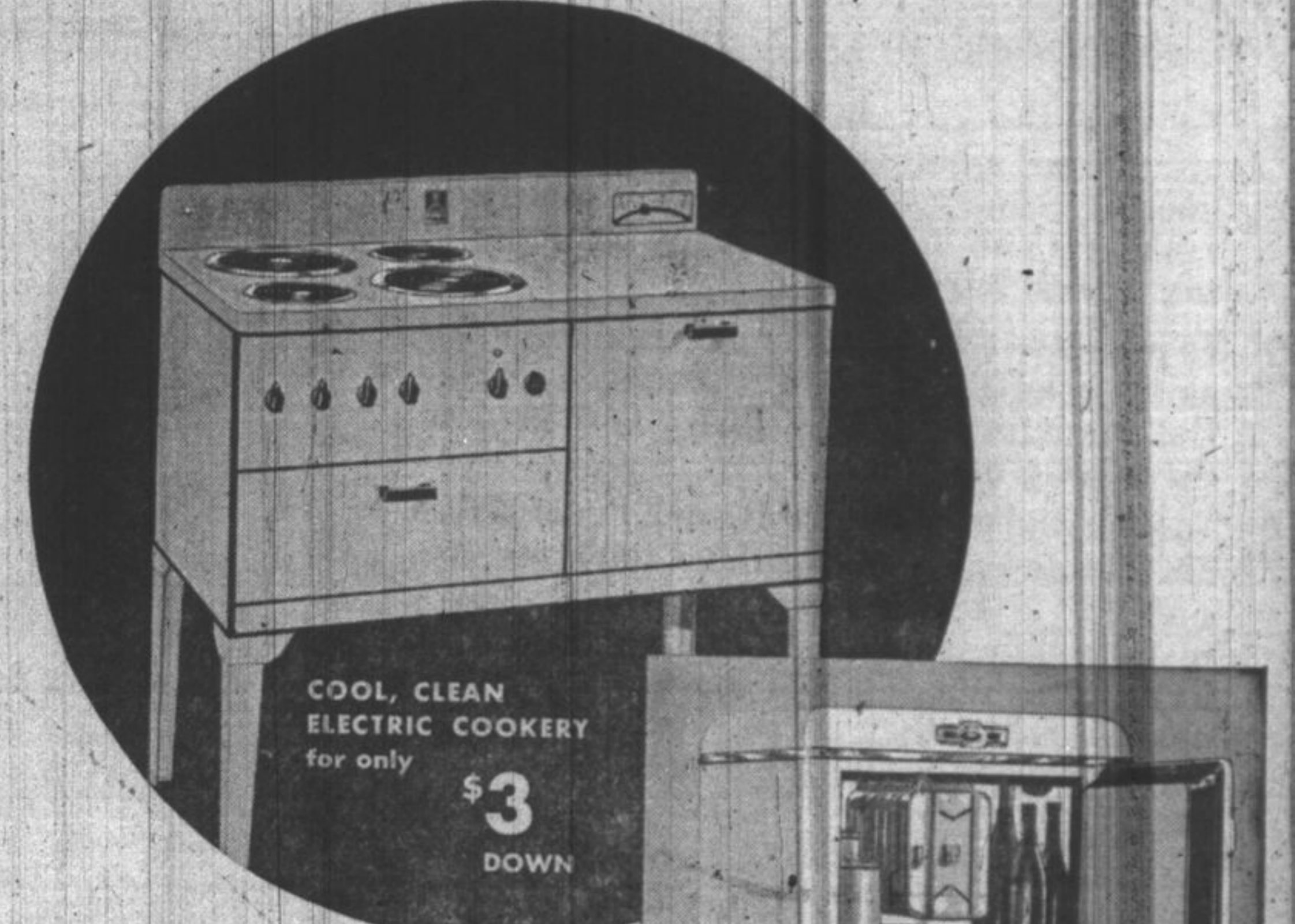

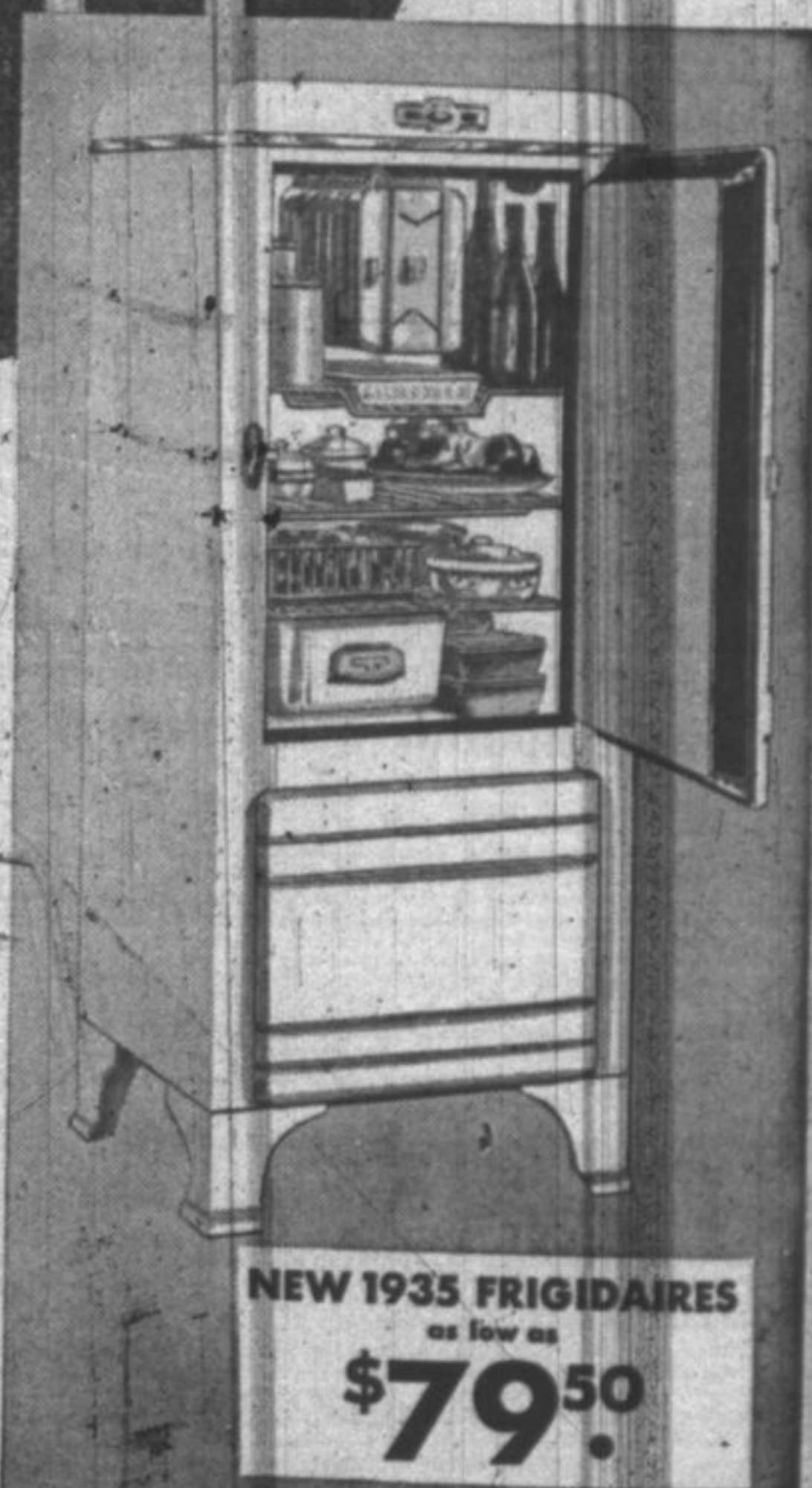
