His brilliant exploits in India are clearly suggested but the greater emphasis of the picture is laid on his human side, his devotion to his wife and the constant conflict between love and duty. An exhibit of Girl Scout handicraft will be displayed at the Highland Park library for two weeks, commencing Friday, April 12. Supplementing the exhibit will be a number of booklets on the bulletin board to explain the scope of the Scout activities.

The work of the Scouts, as varied as it is interesting, shows but a small part of the different aspects of craftsmanship open to Girl Scouts. At summer camp especially there is time for making baskets and bowls and belts as gifts; costumes and drums for play and pageant. At the troop meetings throughout the year the girls learn proficiency in basketry, clay modeling and pottery, leather work, wood carving, sewing, decorations of textiles, and weaving. This list includes only a small number of the many forms which handicraft may take. They might be called a Girl Scout's pass to a voyage of discovery; once embarked, she may choose her own directions, improvise her own equipment, create her own share of art history.
