Church Conference to Start Tuesday

Bishop G. E. Epp to Be First Speaker on Program of 91st Conference of the Evangelical Church to Be Held in Highland Park

BRENT WRENN TO DIRECT FESTIVAL

Receives Appointment as Assistant Director of Chicago Summer Festival

Brent Wrenn, a Deerfield-Shields graduate and former Highland Park resident, who has become prominent along the North Shore as director of the North Shore Little Theatre, has been appointed assistant director of the Chicago Summer Festival which will run for 12 weeks in Chicago, starting June 14. Mr. Wrenn was picked for the position from a selected group of sixty eligible candidates.

The Chicago Park Board is sponsoring the project which will consist of symphony orchestras, operas, light operas, little theatre presentations and other entertainment. The North Shore Little Theatre has been selected to give "Death Takes a Holiday" under Mr. Wrenn's direction. The selection was based on the record of the theater during the past year.

The Chicago Summer Festival will be produced in the band shell north of the Field Museum. The shell is being completely renovated to accommodate the performances and will have a stage with a playing space of 75 by 46 feet. The overall dimensions of the stage will be 150 by 90 feet.

Greenslade, Brown, Taylor and Gourley Elected Commissioners; Buell Elected Police Magistrate; Town Goes Dry by 628 Votes

Swept into office by the large majorities in precincts eight, nine and ten, combined with the good percentage of votes obtained in eight other precincts, William M. Dooley was elected mayor of Highland Park last Tuesday for a second term.

Mayor-elect Dooley, who has been prominent in public life here for many years, had already served as mayor under the old aldermanic system of city government.

Among many other positions Mr. Dooley has held during his long years of service here are postmaster, cashier of both the Highland Park State Bank and North Shore Trust bank, chairman of Red Cross drives, president of the chamber of commerce, school treasurer and many other positions of trust and responsibility.
