MOTHERS' DAY RALLY TO FEATURE SCOUTING EVENTS

Following a band concert from 3 to 3:30 the Boy Scout Mother's Day celebration at Dyche Stadium on May 12, will begin an impressive grand entry of all Cubs, Scouts and Sea Scouts of the North Shore Area Council, the Evanston Council, and the Northwest Suburban Council, which are co-operating to make this event a huge demonstration and a fitting tribute to mothers and their "day."

Following the grand entry there will be a speech by an outstanding speaker and there will be demonstration games by Cubs and Scouts, demonstrations of mass singing, tent pitching, pioneering, fire by friction, Indian dancing, drum and bugle corps, and other spectacular Scouting demonstrations. EXECUTIVE BOARD DISCUSSES COUNCIL PROBLEMS

Sonetone Theater Presents Russian Moving Picture

One of the most thrilling and powerful pictures ever to come out of Soviet Russia will have its Chicago premiere at the Sonetone theatre, (formerly the Punch & Judy) at Van Buren street near Michigan avenue next Friday, April 12. It is "Chapayev," (The Red Commander) and it comes to Chicago after triumphant engagements in Russia, New York, Hollywood and other towns. New York crowds are still packing the Cameo theatre, where the film is now in its twelfth capacity week.

Critics everywhere say that not since the days of the great Soviet silent films has there been anything like "Chapayev."

Superb adventure, rich humor, combined with a wallowing military story makes it one of the "musts" on every movie fan's list. The thrilling story deals with the adventures of the famous peasant leader, Chapayev, and the events that take place during the action of the film are taken from actual occurrences during the hectic Russian Civil wars of 1919. We see Chapayev, who rose from a common soldier, of the Czar's army to Commander of the Red Armies of the East. Directed by Sergei and Georgi Vasilyev, who have taken their places among the world's outstanding cinema directors, "Chapayev" has been acclaimed as a "milestone" in film history by Eisenstein and other leading picture directors all over the world.

Unlike most pictures that have come out of Russia recently, "Chapayev" doesn't deal with mechanical aspects of Russia's Five Year Plan.

It is a human and decidedly humorous story of adventure, with plenty of red-blooded action. A love story is woven through the plot, based on the love of an orderly in the army for the famous machine girl, Maria Popova.

The photography in "Chapayev" is exceptionally effective. Although the picture is in Russian, English subtitles are used to explain the action throughout the story.

Dr. G. G. Atkins To Be Sunday Evening Speaker

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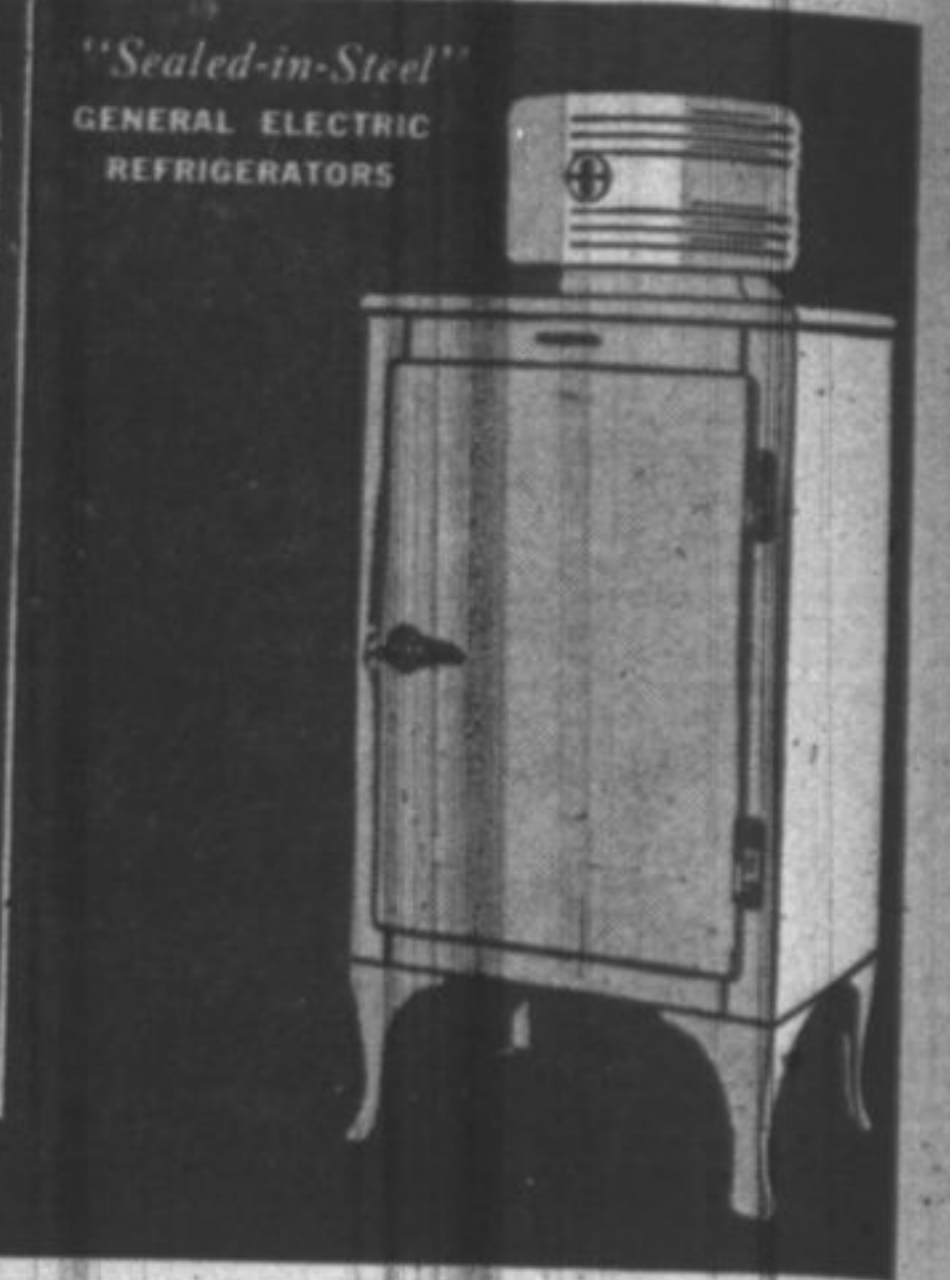
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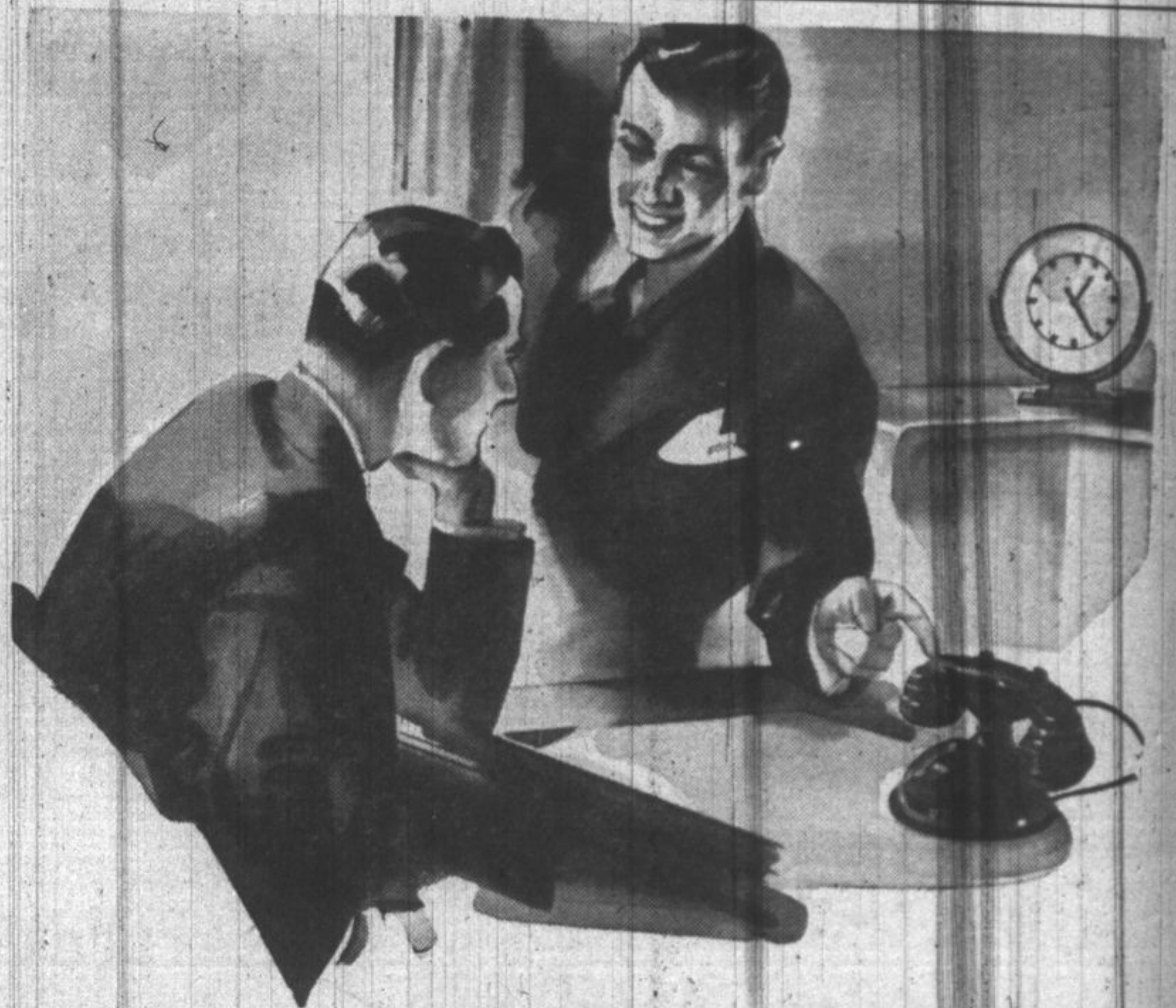
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
