Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Wortham will be moving into the Leslie Brand house next week.

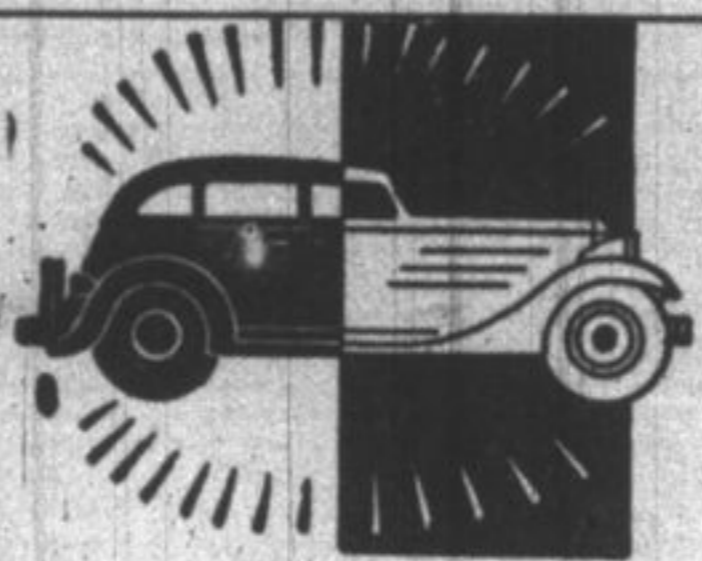
Mrs. John Anfrums has returned from the Highland Park Hospital where she underwent a major operation recently.

The Dorcas Society will hold an all-day meeting Thursday.

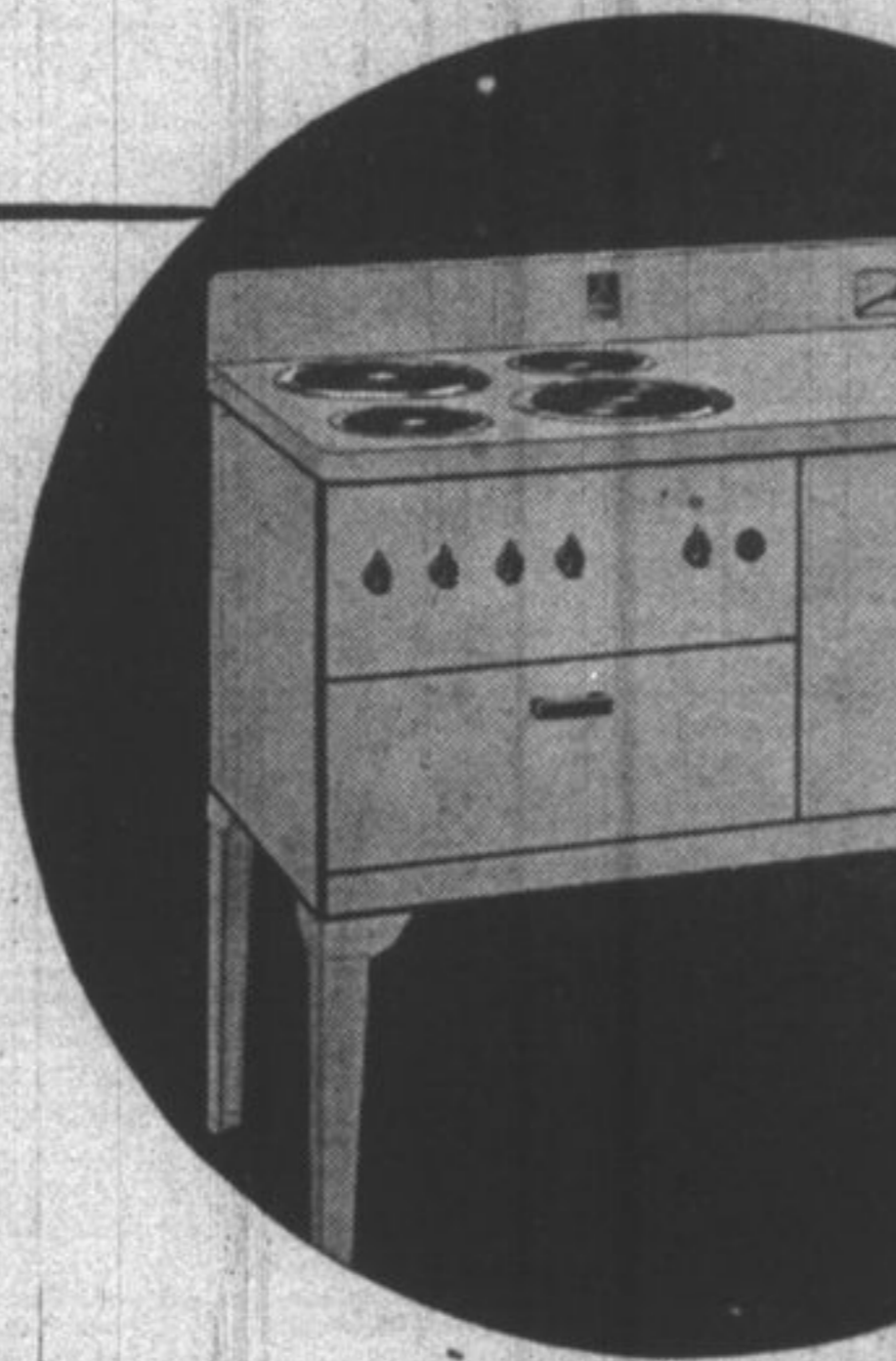
Miss Rose English of Evanston was the guest of her sister, Mrs. Irving Brand on Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Kress announce the birth of a daughter on Sunday, April 21, at the Highland Park Hospital. They now have three little daughters.

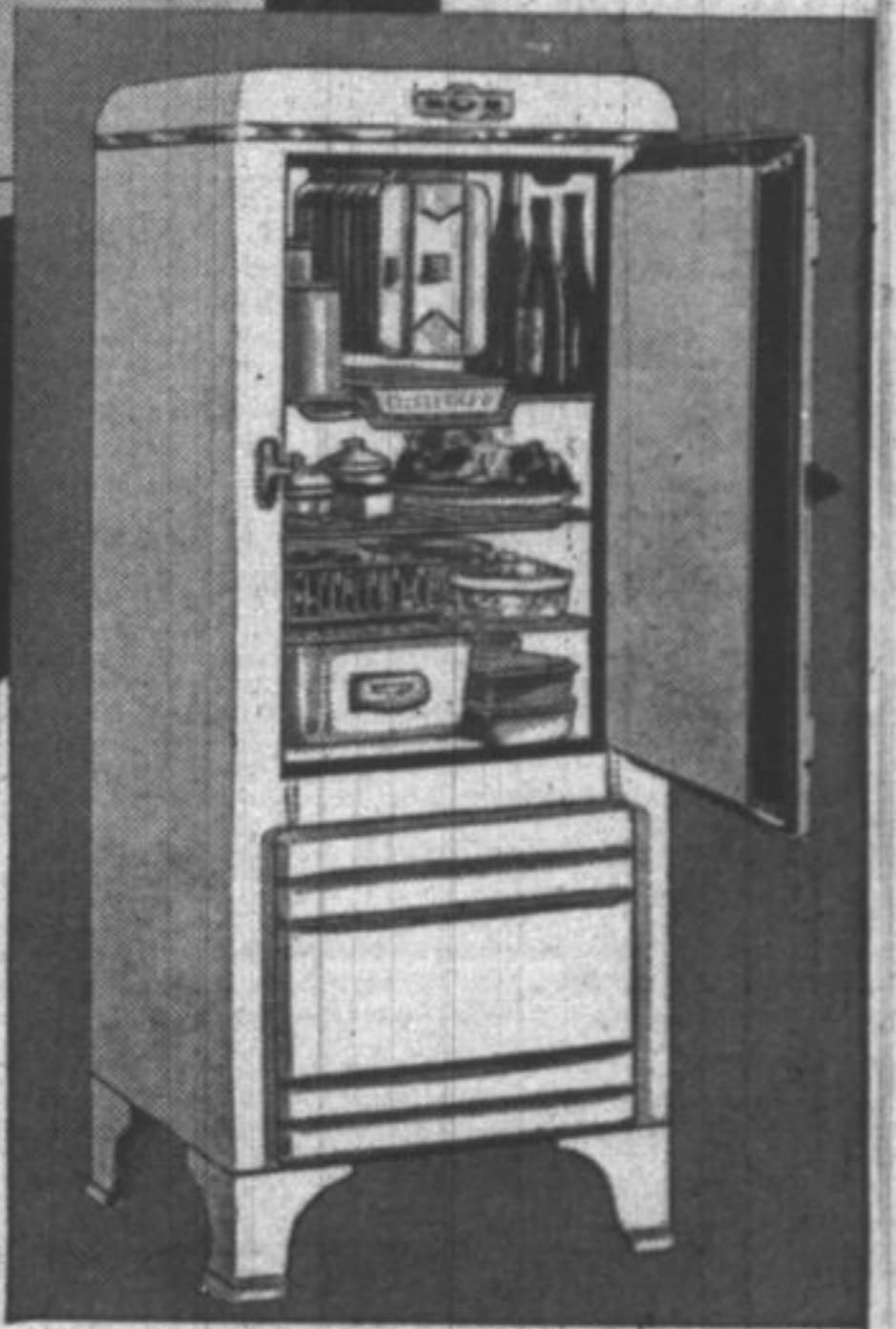
Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Trout have moved from the Kent cottage on Osterman Avenue to Highwood.
