Gerald Hughes Buried in Wichita Falls

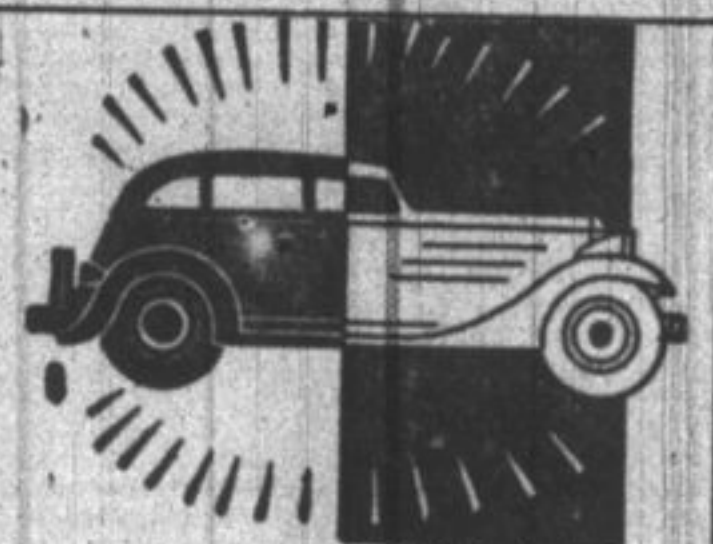
