

CHURCH CONFERENCE DRAWS LARGE CROWD

Over 2000 Attend Closing Service of Evangelical Conference Here Sunday, April 28

Over 2000 people attended the closing services of the 91st session of the Illinois Conference of the Evangelical church here on Sunday. About 500 people crowded into the Bethany church on Sunday morning to hear Bishop George Edward Epp preach the ordination sermon. The afternoon service was held at the high school auditorium where very nearly 2000 people assembled from all parts of the state to hear Bishop Epp deliver a missionary sermon. Following the afternoon sermon, the bishop read the appointments of the ministers for the coming year. Rev. H. F. Siemsen was again assigned to serve at Bethany for the coming year. This makes Rev. Siemsen's seventh year in Highland Park. Rev. E. J. Brusio was also returned to be the pastor of the Bethlehem Evangelical church of Deerfield. This makes Rev. Brusio's fifth year at Deerfield.

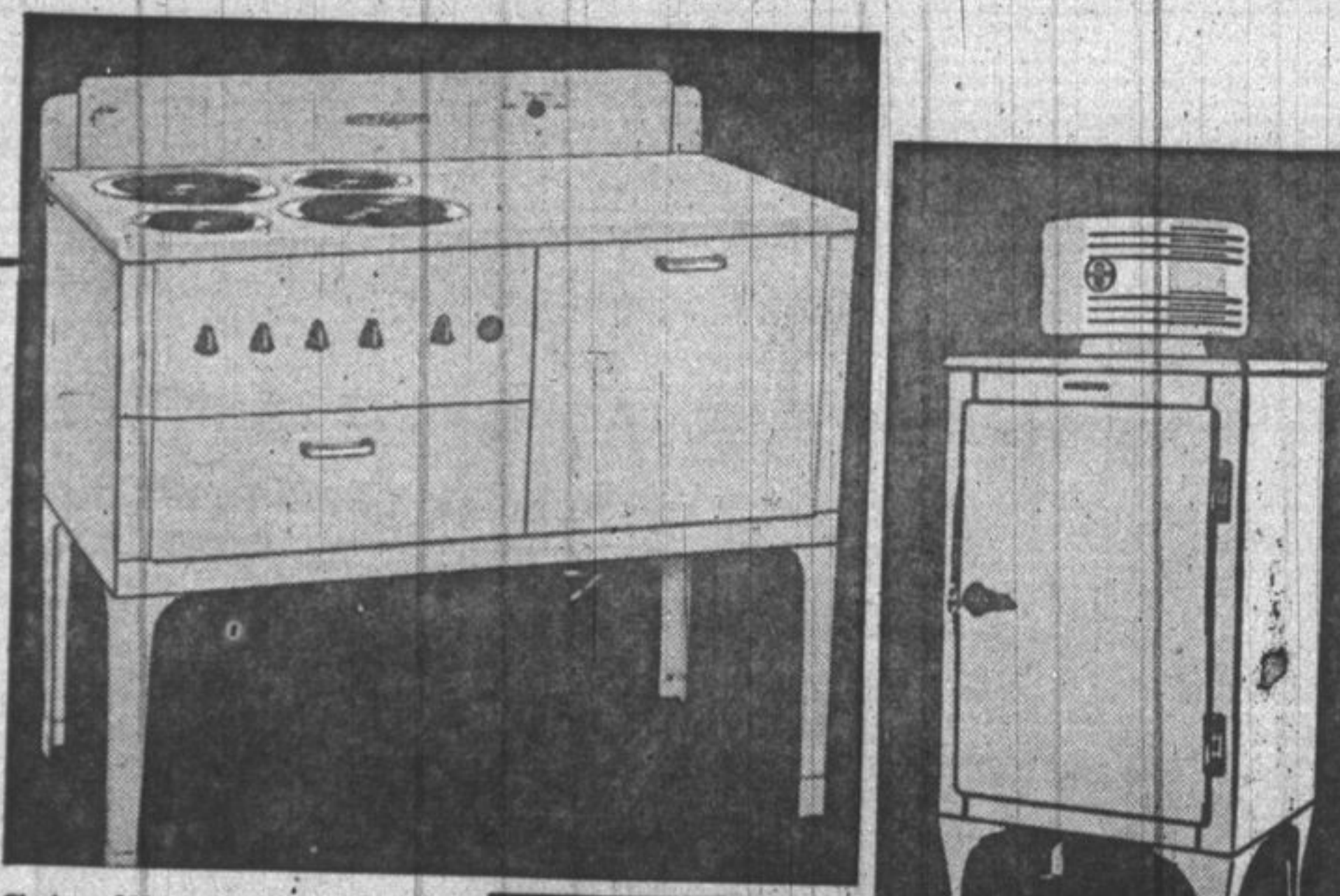
The conference was attended by 214 delegates throughout the past week. These delegates were given a welcome on the part of Highland Park by Commissioner J. H. Taylor on Tuesday evening. Dr. L. W. Sherwin spoke words of welcome on the part of the churches Wednesday noon. The delegates at a whole voiced praise for the splendid entertainment that they received while in Highland Park. Many comments were made about Highland Park's natural beauty. Special praise was given to the Bethany and Bethlehem churches for the splendid manner in which the whole program of the conference was handled and carried through.

Rev. Siemsen of the local church was given two positions of honor and responsibility within the conference. He was elected as a director of the Ministers Insurance company and as a trustee of the conference. The later position is one in which hundreds of thousands of dollars are administered by the trustees and is a position which will require considerable time and effective planning. Rev. Brusio of the Deerfield church was likewise given a position of honor and leadership, as a member of the board of Christian education. It is felt that the conference was very progressive in spirit and that many things were done which will result in effective church work during the coming year.

The vacation dreamed of by every Girl Scout is approaching — camp at Hickory Hill. P. 4121 every afternoon after 4 o'clock to receive registrations, answer questions, and discuss all aspects of camp life.

Camp Hickory Hill will begin its seventh season June 24, with four sessions of two weeks each. It is located near Edgerton, Wis., a drive of about three hours from Highland Park in a deeply wooded spot on a small and private lake.

Camp standards at all Girl Scout camps — and Hickory Hill rules with the best — are many and high and rigidly enforced, under the supervision of the local council as well as the national organization of Girl Scouts.

Miss Marion Hodgins, the camp director, is a trained leader of wide experience. A competent staff of 30 adult counselors, one for every eight girls, will direct camp activities. A registered nurse keeps a careful watch over the girls' health, and a physician's health certificate must be presented before admission to camp.

The meals are appetizing and well balanced, including plenty of pasteurized milk, green vegetables and fresh fruit. The 18 rules of sanitation are scientifically planned and maintained throughout the camp.

Red Cross life savers are in charge of the swimming program. The camp activities include swimming, beginning and advanced classes, Red Cross life saving, canoeing, woodcraft, pioneering, hiking, trailering, country dancing, dramatics, sketching, archery, signaling, nature, stars, flowers, trees, birds, insects, animals, handicrafts, leather, silverwork, weaving, wood carving, pottery, outdoor cooking and games.
