Following Mayor Dooley's inaugural address (which is printed elsewhere in this paper) the commissioners, with the exception of Robert Greenslade who was confined to his home by illness, spoke briefly, expressing their gratification at being elected and pledged their best efforts for the welfare of Highland Park

Commissioner Gourley, who starting his fourth consecutive term of office, reiterated the plea of the Mayor and Ex-Mayor to the citizens regarding patience with the new mayor and council, and pointed out that the general fund alone will be reduced \$8,500. Because of this fact, he said, all municipal service must be curtailed. He stated that he will watch closely over Highland Park's

Commissioner Taylor, who was the next speaker, expressed his appreciatien in being privileged to work with Mayor Dooley and gave his assurance that he would work for the interest of all Highland Park residents. He pointed out that in spite of the curtailed budget the commissioners and mayor would do their and said that he believed that their best would be satisfactory.

Commissioner Brown stated that he would cooperate with the rest of the council in every way possible and urged that the citizens of Highland Park continue to attend the weekly meetings of the council.

Mayor Dooley, speaking for Commissioner Greenslade, said that he (Greenslade) had pledged himself to work with the mayor and the new council to the best of his ability and to cooperate in every way to secure the best government possible for Highland Park.

Under the new set-up, Commissioner Gourley will have charge of Accounts and Finances, Brown of Public Property, Greenslade of Public Health and Safety and Taylor of Streets and Improvements.

The only business transacted at the meeting was the passage of an ordinance transferring the building department from the department of Public Property to the department of Streets and Improvements. Because of the absence of Commissioner Greenslade, no appointments to city positions were announced.
