Church Council To Meet in Highland Park

One of the series of distinct institutes which have been planned by the Lake County Council of Religious Education for the month of May will be held at the Grace M. E. Church, Highland Park, at Loretta Place and North Avenue, Monday evening, May 13, beginning at 7:30 p.m. This includes churches in the townships of Deerfield, West Deerfield and Shields.

The devotional service will be led by Rev. Allan Billman, pastor of Grace M. E. Church, and the evening's address will be delivered by Rev. Fred Baldus, president of the county organizations, and pastor of the First Baptist Church of Waukegan, after which the group will be separated into several sections work with children and young people in the churches and also a conference of Sunday School superintendents and other officers, to study their particular problems and work. Poppy Day To Be Observed Here On Saturday, May 25

On Saturday, May 25, which will be Poppy day in Highland Park, the women of Dumaresq Spencer unit of the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute little red poppies on the streets to be worn in honor of the World war dead. The observance here will be part of the annual nationwide observance of Poppy day, during which millions will pay tribute to the memory of the war dead by wearing memorial poppies.

Poppy day activities here will be directed by a committee from the Auxiliary headed by Mrs. P. E. Cole, poppy chairman.

The poppies which will be worn here have been ordered from the Veterans hospital No. 105 at North Chicago, where they have been made by disabled World war veterans. The poppy making has provided employment for needy veterans through the winter and spring months, enabling them to help support themselves and families. Public response on Poppy day will determine how soon and how extensively this work can be reopened.

In exchange for the poppies, the Auxiliary women will ask each person to make a contribution for the welfare of the war's living victims, the disabled veterans, the widows and the fatherless children of veterans. This money will be used entirely in the welfare work of the Auxiliary, the bulk of it in the work of the local unit.

Infant Welfare To Observe Mother's Day

Sunday, May 12, will be Mother's Day. This year in addition to the sentimental significance of the day there will be a nation-wide effort to reduce the hazards of childbirth through education of the lay public, first as to the facts in connection with maternal deaths, and second, as to what could be done to make child-bearing safe for mother and child.

It is estimated that approximately 16,000 women die every year in the United States from causes connected with childbirth. Wherever scientific methods of maternity care have been applied, there has been a practical demonstration that fully one-half of these maternal deaths are unnecessary. In Chicago the work of the Infant Welfare Society among the needy expectant mothers furnishes such a demonstration.

The society provides this adequate maternity care in twelve of its eighteen stations. Last year among 1734 mothers cared for with 990 delivered cases during the year, there was only one death, or a death rate of 1 per thousand live births compared to a maternal death rate for all Chicago of 4.3 per thousand live births. The one maternal death which the Infant Welfare Society reports for 1934 occurred in the Alice H. Wood station, which is supported by the Highland Park Rav-
