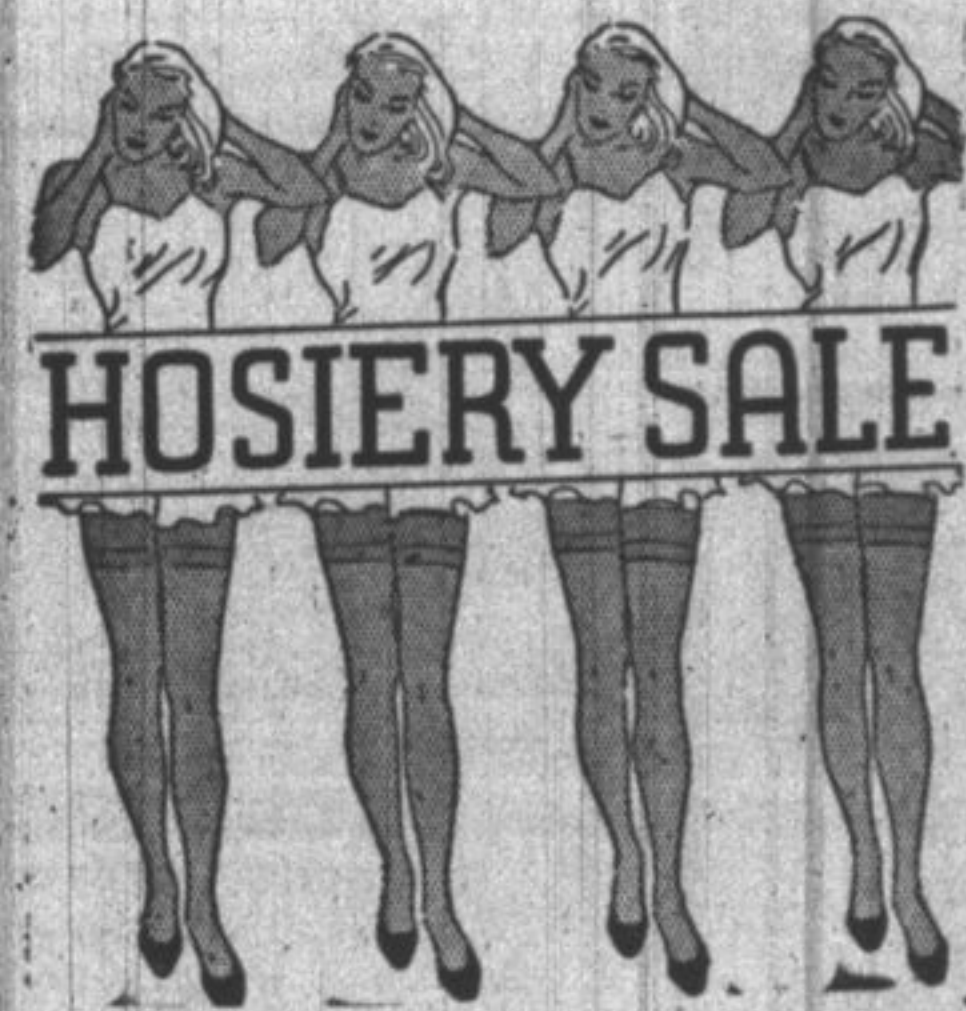

Highwood Man Commits Suicide

Albert Sprague, 58, Highwood, for 32 years a railroad employee, committed suicide Wednesday afternoon May 15, by shooting himself with a .32 calibre rifle.

Sprague, who had been a motor-man on the North Shore railroad line for some time, had been despondent lately because the railroad company had employed him only part time on account of his poor eyesight.

During his many years in Lake county, he told little of his personal affairs to co-workers or to Harry Burke, a friend, with whom he has lived for the past ten years at 304 Palmer avenue, Highwood. He originally came to Lake county from Sterling, Ill., and is survived by a brother, James Sprague of Chicago.

At the inquest conducted by Coroner John L. Taylor at Kelley's undertaking parlor at Highland Park, a corner's jury returned a verdict of death caused by a self-inflicted gunshot wound.
