

Final Announcement of Concert by Roger Balke

A great deal of interest is being shown in the approaching concert by Roger Balke, pianist, which will take place in the Ravinia Village House, Ravinia, Illinois, on Wednesday evening, May 29.



The program is given below in full:

- 1. Toccata and Fugue, in D minor for Organ (Transcription by Tausig)
- 2. Air, from the Suite for String Orchestra, No. 2 (Transcription by Alexander Siloti)
- 3. Sarabande, from Suite VI for Violoncello (Transcription by Jan Chiapusso)

Seata, Opus 57 (Appassionata) (Cavalli)

Chant Du Soir (Abendlied) (Transcription by St. Saens)

Rhapsody, Opus 79, No. 1 Johannes Brahms

Mr. Balke contributes the following musical notes:

The opening number Bach's Toccata and Fugue, in D minor for organ, was studied at Fontainebleau under Marcel Dupre, noted French organist. His interpretation is best carried over in the Tausig transcription, which is also an excellent technical arrangement.

The second number in the Bach group, Air, from the Suite for String Orchestra, No. 3, has been transcribed by Alexander Siloti. This was chosen instead of the Mason transcription because it gives greater possibilities of beautiful tone

and feeling of pizzicato in the bass as the octave passages continue throughout. It contains not merely a single melody; at times there are four or five.

Barbara Balke, violoncellist, was the inspiration for the selection of the Sarabande, from Suite VI for Violoncello, as the concluding number of this group. The soothing melody and fine melodic possibilities are nicely handled in Jan Chiapusso's transcription.

The Mozart Sonata, in F major, is one of the best liked of his sonatas. The first and last movements present a number of technical difficulties which cannot be solved in a short time. The Adagio movement is a complete composition in itself.

Mr. Balke gives his individual interpretation to the great work, the Sonata Appassionata, by Beethoven. The man Beethoven was greatly influenced by an antipathy of fate which shadowed him the greater part of his life and the number three was a fateful one to him. He used not only groups of three as the melody but also when the composition is at its greatest height, the repeated chords are grouped in three. It is interesting to note what a strong influence an antipathy of this sort had on a mind like Beethoven's.

Chant Du Soir, by Schumann, the first number in the fourth group, is the only composition on the program which Mr. Balke studied with Philipp in Paris. The problem here is to keep the chant above the accompaniment.

The Brahms Rhapsody, Opus 79, No. 1, was studied with Adolp Veidig of this composition in strict tenary form, possesses lyric qualities similar to a lullaby. The last section

is a study in counterpoint with two main themes. The Rhapsody exhibits some of the finest qualities of Brahms' writing.

La Cathedrale Engloutie, by Debussy, is built around the legend of a city behind a hill beside the seashore. The town was below sea level and as the sea wore away the hill, it flooded the city. In the last half of the composition one can hear the water gurgling around the bells. It is said that when the ocean is calm one can look down on this submerged city and see the bells in the top of the cathedral. Howard Welles, under whom Mr. Balke has studied, teaches an interpretation of the bells that makes the droning qualities of the fundamentals of the bells prominent, by changing the pedal after the chord has been played.

The concluding number on the program, the Tarantella, by Liszt, is also known as the Neapolitan Variations. It is a composition that affords a great display of technique.

Mrs. Anna Larson Dies Monday, May 20
