World's Fair Salvage Sold Throughout U. S.

Demolition of the buildings and equipment owned by A Century of Progress is producing salvage in the form of over 200,000 feet of plaster board, plywood, and lumber each day. It was announced yesterday by R. A. Goldman of Barker, Goldman, and Lubin, wrecking company in charge of the work. Last week nine carloads of material were shipped to lumber yards in Indiana, Michigan, Kentucky, and Iowa. Over 100 carloads of structural steel has been sold to a New York firm to be shipped on barges through the Great Lakes.

Five hundred men are employed on the Fair grounds by the wrecking company. Mr. Goldman stated that when the daylight time lengthens, the wrecking will be placed on a two shift basis. He said that when lake traffic opens freight steamers will be loaded from the Century of Progress docks.

A new excavating shovel especially designed for tearing out concrete pilings has been ordered for excavation work. The shovel, Diesel powered, will be the only one of its kind in operation.

All of the structures occupying 400 acres must be cleared away by the end of next November.

CCC Enrollment To Be Expanded

The Lake County Emergency Relief Committee of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission announces the CCC July enrollment period which will extend from June 15 to August 31. The quota for Illinois has been increased from 22,000 to 34,500. The quota for this enrollment is estimated at approximately 20,000 Junior Selectees. This is more than three times the usual enrollment quota and more than twice as large as the recent April quota. The quota for Lake county will be 208.

An important change in the rules governing selection of Juniors has been announced. The age limits for Junior Selectees are now from 18 to 28 years, inclusive, instead of from 18 to 25. The privilege of enrollment recently inaugurated in the April enrollment continues and is available to young men who have had as much as five months of previous service with honorable discharge and not to exceed thirteen months of service.

While applications of properly qualified young men from relief families should always receive first consideration, selection is also to be made from families of the unemployed not on relief and also from families in which members are employed but where the total family income is still insufficient for family needs.

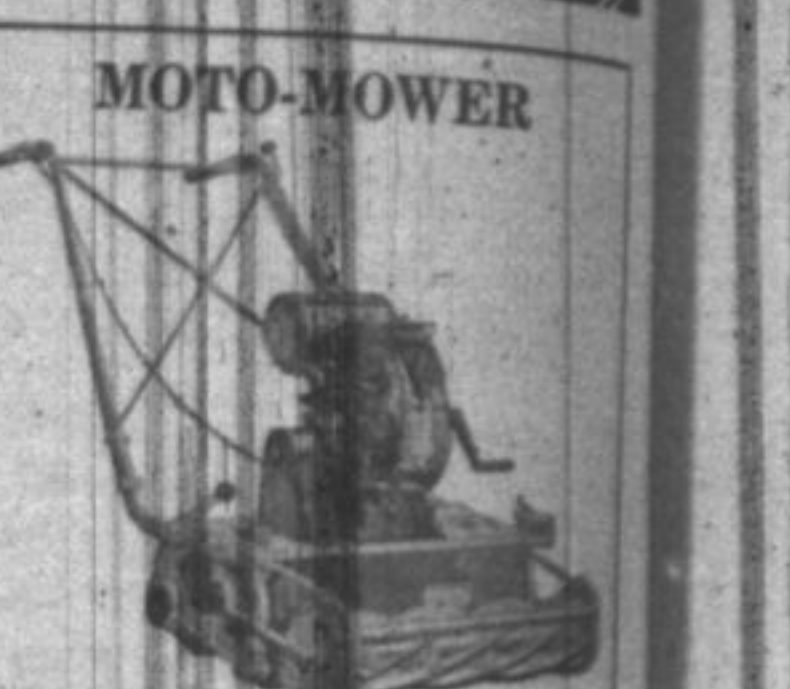
All young men interested are urged to immediately register at
