School Board Takes Action to Protect New School at Lake Forest

The board of education of the Waukegan Township High School recently took action forbidding the admission of students from the non-high school district of Lake County next school term, unless arrangements are made this summer by the non-high school board to pay the full per capita tuition cost of its pupils attending that high school. Due to this action and to the fact that the non-high school district is in arrears with its payments to the Deerfield - Shields Township High School, the Deerfield - Shields High School Board of Education, at a meeting on May 13, took similar action. It was thought a large number, if not all, of the pupils barred from the Waukegan Township High School.

City to Sponsor Clean-Up Week June 10 to 15

The City Administration has designated the week of June 10 to 15 as annual Clean-Up week and announces that collections will be made on certain days in certain districts. No ashes will be hauled away by the city trucks, and all tins, cans and other rubbish must be placed in containers and put out on parkways. The city workmen will not go into basements or yards to collect the materials.

The days of collection in the several districts are as follows: Monday, June 10 - Vine avenue north to city limits. Tuesday, June 11 - Vine avenue to Laurel avenue. Wednesday, June 12 - Laurel avenue to Lincoln avenue. Thursday, June 13 - Lincoln avenue to Roger Williams avenue. Friday, June 14 - Roger Williams avenue to County Line road.

2600 TO BE TRAINED AT FORT SHERIDAN

CMTC, ROTC and ORC to Be Stationed Here During Summer Period

Announcement is made by Brigadier General Dana T. Merrill, the post commander, that the summer training camp season will open on June 12 at Fort Sheridan. Provisions have been made in the war department appropriation bill, effective July 1, for the training of more than 2600 men at Fort Sheridan this year, compared to less than 1400 in 1934. Preparations are now being made for this increased enrollment and the summer camp area will be taxed to capacity.

Lt. Colonel Charles A. Chapman, coast artillery corps (R.O.T.C. University of Illinois) is detailed as the camp executive.

The camps comprise the following: 1100 CMTC boys will arrive on July 1 for a period of one month's training. 900 of these boys are infantry and 200 cavalry students. This is almost double the number trained last year.

About 400 ROTC's will receive a course of training for six weeks. These men must put in a six weeks' active duty period before they receive their commissions as second lieutenants in the organized reserve corps upon graduating from college. This camp is usually between their junior and senior year.

About 1000 ORC officers from Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin will be here this summer. So that they can be of maximum assistance in handling CMTC and ROTC contingents, they will be divided into three groups. The first group will arrive several days before the CMTC camp opens; the second in time to be oriented before the first leaves and the third will be here until the CMTC camp is over. Those not assigned on CMTC duty will receive training as groups or with troops of their branch of the service.

2000 National Guard Coast Artillery men, who were not trained here last year, will be in camp toward the end of the summer for two weeks training periods.

Starting about June 15 and continuing until around the first of July, the fort will have, in addition to the summer camps, about 2000 CCCs, sent in from the Pacific coast for discharge and about 6000 new enrollees will arrive between June 15 and July 15 to be processed, examined, equipped and organized into companies to be sent to the Pacific coast. Twenty-nine new companies are also being organized in this corps area. The men for these companies will be received at Fort Sheridan from Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin and will be conditioned and sent to the Pacific coast.

The approach of the summer camp season coincides with the departure from the post of many regular troops on various problems and projects. The 61st coast artillery, anti-aircraft is now on a tour around the Lake Michigan and Wisconsin. The third Field Artillery starts Monday, June 3, for Camp McCoy, at Sparta, Wis. The first Squadron, 14th Cavalry, left on May 31 on its way to Rock Island for its annual field march and maneuvers.

Orchestra to Play - For the professional orchestra will play the march "Pomp and Circumstance," by Elgar. The number "The Der Freischutz" by Weber will be played as the interlude. For the recreational orchestra will play "Under the Double Eagle."

The presentation of honors and diplomas will be made by George T. Rogers, president of the board of education.
