

COX TO COACH AT ALFRED UNIVERSITY

Having signed a two-year contract as head coach in football, basketball, and track with the officials at Alfred university, Alfred, New York, Mr. Cox will not return to Deerfield-Shields next year.

Alfred university, one of the outstanding ceramic engineering schools in the country, has put out many championship track teams. Last season it also had a strong basketball team. In football Alfred university has stiff competition and is successful in as far as its material permits.

Mr. Cox began his career of coaching as soon as he was graduated from college. He was graduated from Colgate with the distinction of being one of the best centers that ever attended that school. He was chosen as All-Eastern center for two years, in '28 and '29, and received honorable mention on many All-American teams in 1929 when he captained his team.

Coach Cox was also picked for an All-East team that played an All-West team in San Francisco, California. After the game, he was elected co-captain with "Bronko" Nagurski of the Chicago Bears.

He coached one year at Toronto, Ohio, and then coached at Martin's Ferry, where they had a championship football team the two years he was there.

This is Mr. Cox' first venture in coaching university teams.
