Mrs. Walter Page was hostess to the Quid.Nunc Club on Tuesday evening.

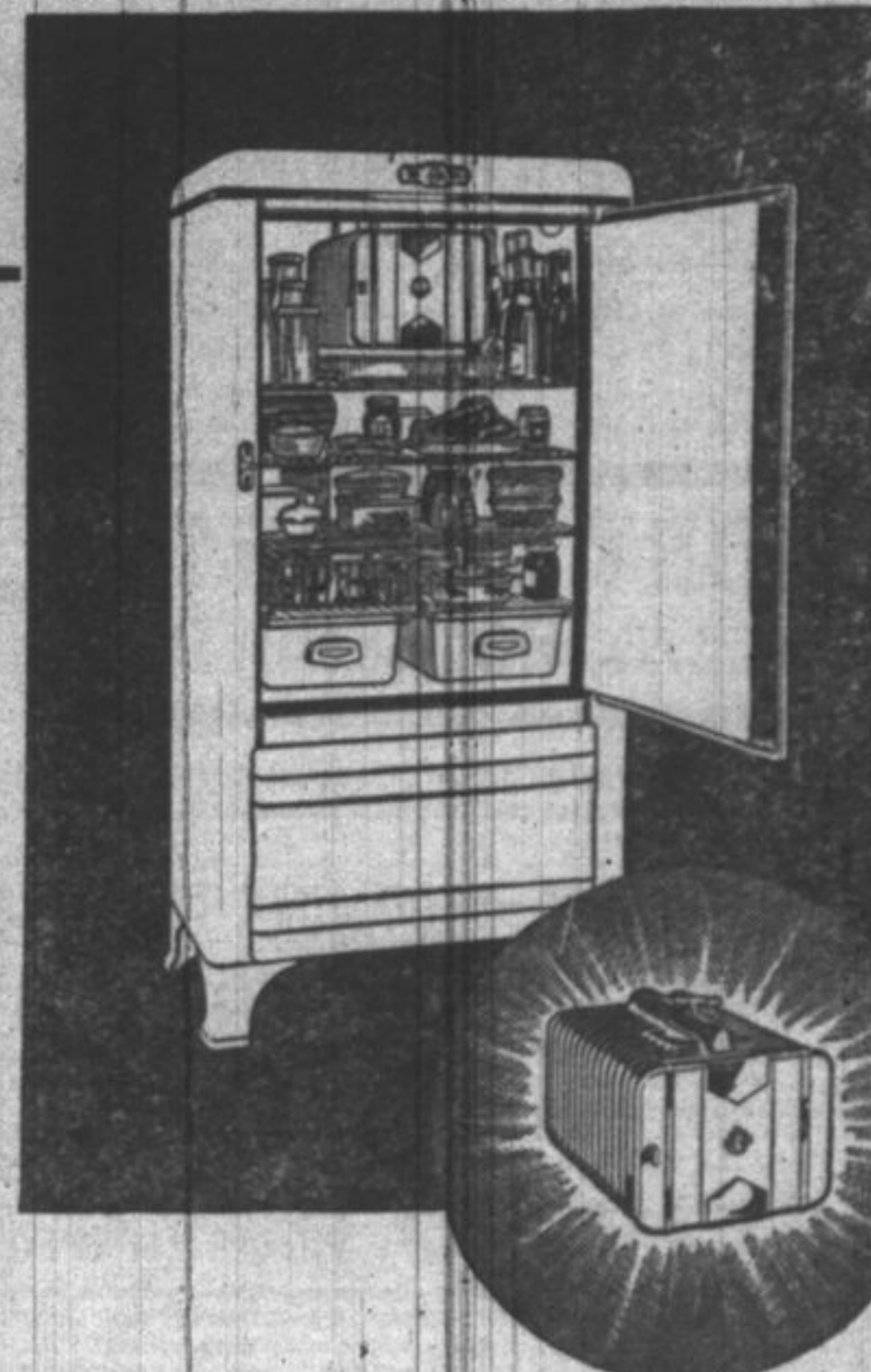
