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PLYMOUTH TAKES TO THE SKIES

A small airplane powered with a Plymouth automobile engine has been constructed and successfully tested by the Nicholas-Beazley Airplane Co., Inc. of Marshall, Mo., according to Mr. Deibler of the Deibler Motor Corp., 22-24 South First Street of this city. The "Plyma-coupe" as the plane is called has a maximum speed of 120 miles per hour and a cruising speed of 100 miles an hour. It weighs 1,078 pounds. The engine is a standard six cylinder Plymouth engine, and was selected, according to Mr. Nicholas, because of its favorable powerweight ratio and full pressure lubrication system. The high pressure lubrication is a feature that keeps it in perfect operating condition at sustained high speeds and makes it particularly desirable for aircraft use.—Adv.
