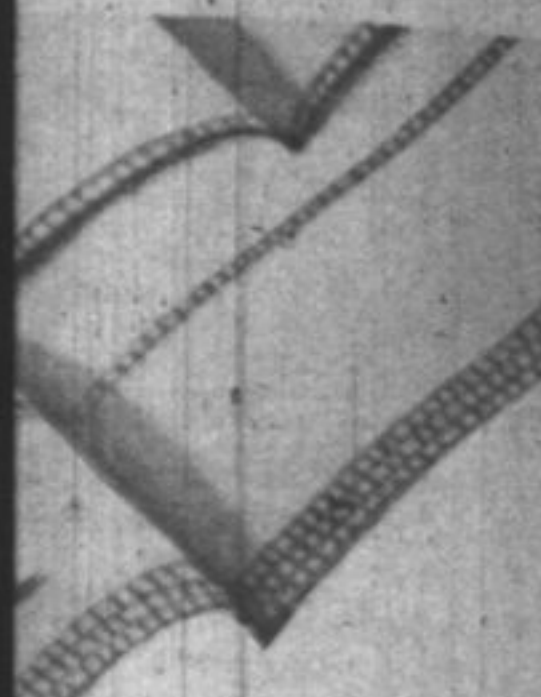

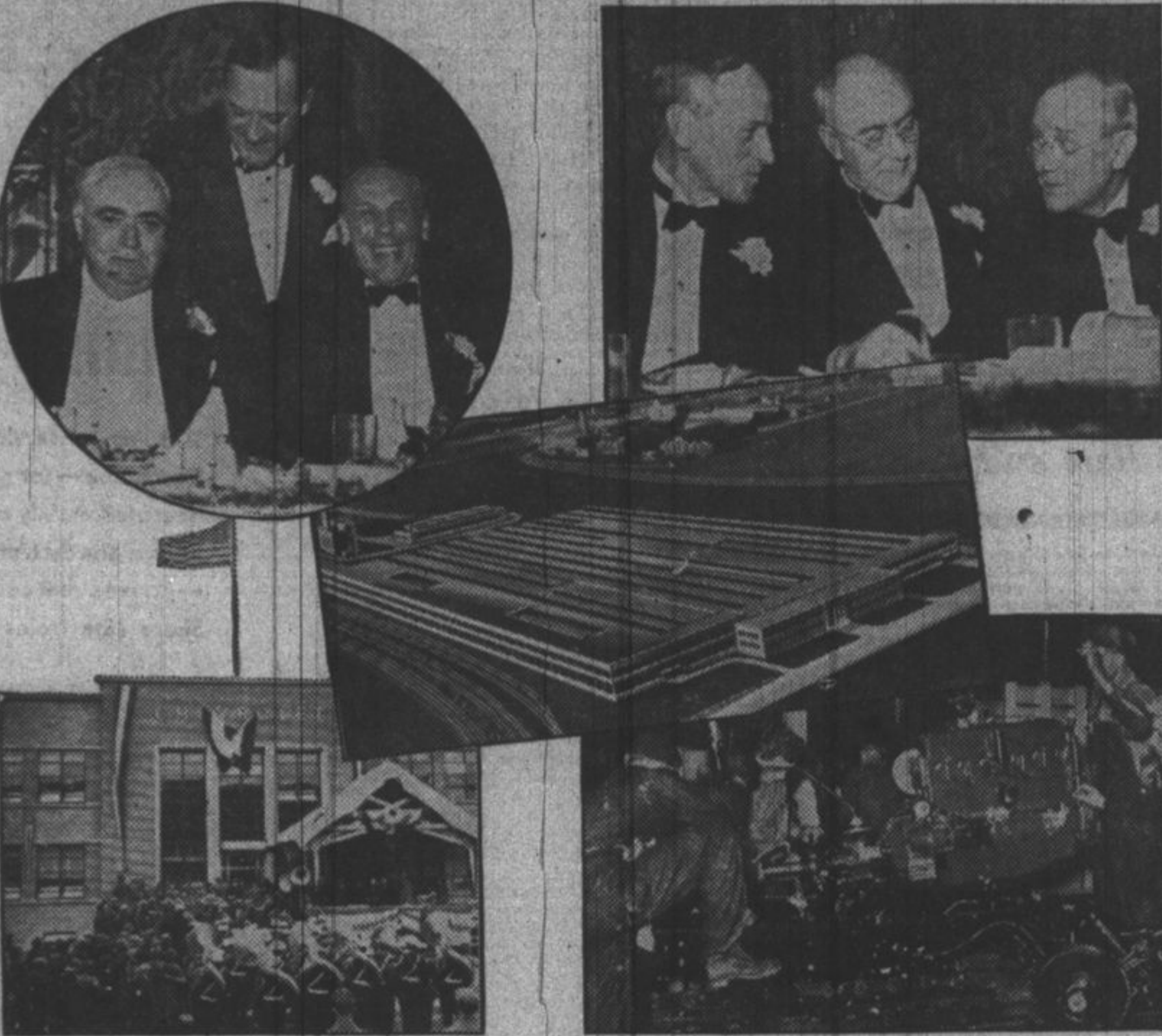

### Midwest Institute of International Relations To Be Held in Evanston

The Fourth Annual Midwest Institute of International Relations will be held this year in Evanston from June 24 to July 5. The meeting is an intensive twelve-day review of current issues in international relations and has been arranged in co-operation with Northwestern University.

Following is a schedule of the lectures to be presented:

June 24—Senator Gerald P. Nye, United States Senator from North Dakota, "Munitions, War, and Profits." The Evanston League of Women Voters cooperates with the Institutes in presenting Senator Nye, chairman. Senate Munitions Investigating committee, at Haven School, Prairie avenue and Lincoln Street.

June 25—Sidney B. Fay, professor of history, Harvard University, on "Parallels between 1914 and 1935."

June 26—George H. Blakeslee, expert on Lytton Commission of Inquiry to Manchuria, "America and Japan in the Pacific."

June 28—James Weldon Johnson, professor of creative literature, Fisk University, "The Art of Being Civilized."

June 30—D. Elton Trueblood, associate professor of philosophy, at Haverford College, "Alternatives to Violence," at First Baptist Church, admission free.

July 1—Speaker and subject to be announced later.

July 3—Senator William H. Dieterich, United States Senator from Illinois, "The Treaty Making Power of the United States Senate."

July 5—Harold G. Moulton, president, The Brookings Institute, of Washington, D.C., "Isolation or Co-operation?"

Unless otherwise indicated the lectures are to be held in Great Hall, First Methodist Episcopal church, Evanston, at 8:15 o'clock.
