Two assist cords and a dome light are included in the rear compartment appointments. A new and improved luggage compartment located behind the rear seat is a feature of the sedan.

The DeLuxe Airstream Eight is powered by an engine of 3 1/4 inches bore and 4 1/4 inches stroke. Famous

Chrysler floating power engine mountings are used, insuring the smooth, vibrationless performance that is characteristic of all Chrysler cars. Engine and transmission are cradled in rubber so that the entire power plant is suspended in perfect balance and power tremors are taken up by the rubber, instead of being transmitted to the body. Among the distinctive engine features are positive manual starter, anodic treated T-slot pistons, valve seat inserts, manifold heat control and automatic choke.
