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SNITE'S BAGHEERA WINS YACHT RACE

John T. (Bud) Snite, of Highland Park, sailed his big schooner Bagheera to victory in the cruising class last Saturday in the Columbia Yacht club's 44th annual race from Chicago to Michigan City. Snite's crew included his father, Albert P. Snite; his brother, Albert O. Snite; Holly Gleason, Grover Steffen, Lynn Williams, Ed Carley, and Fully Dean. Bagheera's corrected time for the 32 1/2 miles was 5 hours 3 minutes and 13 seconds.

The winner of the racing, or universal, class time prize was Gossoon H. R. sloop, owned by Sterling Morton, Malcolm Vail, and Joseph A. Moller. Corrected time for Gossoon II, was 4 hours 47 minutes and 55 seconds.

The Bagheera was first of the fleet of 63 windjammers to cross the finish line. It was also first in its division, that for class A cruising sailers. Elapsed time for the Bagheera, a 55 foot schooner, was 5 hours 24 minutes and 59 seconds. The elapsed time for Gossoon II, was 5:42.42.

Gus Nyland's sloop Springtime took first place on corrected time in the Seawanhaka class in 5:19.11.

The fleet started Saturday morning from the Grant park harbor in a moderate northeast breeze. Later the wind veered toward the east and lightened.

There were several women aboard the racing craft. Miss Elizabeth Reber's 43 foot schooner Picaroon was sailed by its owner.

Triumph of a young owner-skipper, barely out of his teens, aboard the winner Bagheera, surprised many veteran yachtsmen. Probably the oldest man to sail in the race was Herman Redlich, 70, father of Dr. William Redlich, skipper of the schooner Auf Wiedersehen.

Last year's racing division winner, the Q class sloop Princess, won in the large universal sloop division. Princess corrected time was 4:53.57. John O'Rourke's new 8 meter class sloop Shamrock placed second.

Robert Williamson of the Jackson Park Y. C. sailed his schooner Edith III, in the class B cruising event and won on both elapsed and corrected time from 11 other class B boats.

20,000 Depositors Receive Insured Bank Deposits

A report just released by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation reveals that twenty thousand depositors of closed insured banks have been paid their insured deposits in the first seventeen months of deposit insurance.

They were depositors in seventeen closed banks which the Insurance Corporation had taken over up to May 31, and their insured claims totalled more than two and a quarter million dollars. In all there have been 25,000 depositors in these

banks whose estimated insured funds amount to about two and one-half million dollars.

has started within an average time of a week of the day the banks closed the report shows. It further reveals that in the last bank to be taken over by the Insurance Corporation all but sixty dollars of insured money has been paid to depositors. The pay-off began on May 13 and all but twelve of its depositors had received a settlement of their claim on the last day of the month.

Approximate total deposits in all the closed insured banks are \$3,760,000. In addition to the insured portion of that total of almost \$2,500,000 another million was in preferred or secured deposits or was subject to offset so that there remain less than two hundred thousand dollars to be paid to depositors as liquidation of the assets of these banks is made.

It is estimated by officials of the corporation that ninety-nine out of every hundred of the individual depositors in the closed insured banks have received all the money they had on deposit, or will receive it just as soon as they come to the banks.

The F.D.I.C. is insuring deposits in 14,000 banks throughout the country at the present time. It has announced that this is ninety per cent of all licensed commercial banks and that they hold all but two per cent of the total bank deposits.
