The national matches which have been suspended during the period of financial economy are to be resumed again this year at Camp Perry, Ohio, the dates having been set from September 1-19, 1935. The National Rifle Association Matches for which medals and trophies are provided by the National Rifle Association will be held from Saturday, Sept. 7, 1935, to Friday, Sept. 13, 1935 (7 days) both dates inclusive.

The national rifle and pistol matches for which are awarded the national trophies, medals, and other badges will be held from Saturday, Sept. 14, to Thursday, Sept. 19, 1935 (6 days) both dates inclusive.

The small arms firing school is held in conjunction with the above matches, beginning Sunday, Sept. 1, and running throughout the entire period of the contest, terminating on Sept. 19, 1935.

Reports received in the National Guard Bureau to date indicate an interest on the part of the National Guard in the revival of the national matches. Twelve states and the District of Columbia have already indicated their intention of entering teams.
