Federal Education Office Reports on Teachers' Welfare

Two of every three large cities in the United States require school teachers to submit a certificate of health before they can be appointed. One of every five of these cities also require that examination of the teacher be made by the school physician, the Federal Office of Education announced today.

Dr. James Frederick Rogers, office of education consultant in hygiene, recently studied present practices of city schools with reference to health examinations of teachers before and after employment, and the granting of leave on account of illness and for purposes of study and recreation. His report titled "The Welfare of the Teacher," appears as Office of Education Bulletin 1934 No. 4, (ten cents).

What conditions prevent the employment of a teacher? Answers to Office of Education inquiries reveal that few schools have attempted to lay down definite rules on the subject and that where definite standards have been set up, those of one school system differ from those of another.

"To be on the safe and sympathetic side," said Dr. Rogers today, "no hard and fast rules can be laid down, but a list of conditions may well be set forth as suggestive to the examiner."

The Office of Education study shows that in Philadelphia, during a recent year, major defects found in physical examination of teachers were defective vision, defective teeth, and hernia. Errors in personal hygiene revealed by periodical health examinations of 5,105 school employees were largely insufficient recreation, fresh air, or exercise, excess of carbohydrates, habitual use of patent medicines, and insufficient water. Diseases and defects found in periodical health examinations of 3,859 teachers included defective vision, diseased tonsils, overweight, and flat feet.

"There is every reason for all concerned," Dr. Rogers said, "that the teacher, after employment, be put and kept in best condition for work. Remedial defects should be corrected. Habits interfering with the best service she can render should not be tolerated. The practice of placing the teacher on probation as to her physical condition works well for all concerned. An annual examination by the school physician also should produce good results."

With regard to sick leave, the Office of Education learned that only about 7 per cent of the larger cities do not have some scheme for granting such leave. The percentage rises to 25 in cities of from 5,000 to 10,000 population. At least five cities grant unlimited sick leave at full salary, and in Bristol, R. I., where this plan of leave has been in effect for more than 10 years, there is the lowest average absence of teachers on account of illness of which the Office of Education has records. The average loss of time for 85 teachers was 1.17 days.

"The granting of sabbatical leave for travel, study, or other purposes at a 7-year or 10-year or other interval in the teaching career seems to have interested few school authorities, especially in cities of fewer than 100,000 population. Sabbatical leave applies to a comparatively small group of teachers--those who are in service for a number of years, who are likely to remain, and who are among the best of teachers because of their experience."

Elm Place Participates in Red Cross Book Drive

Elm Place School has contributed toward a book project instituted by the Junior Red Cross of the Chicago Chapter in its school auxiliaries. The schools have been asked to set aside a "Share-A-Book-Shelf" where, all during the year books may be assembled to be passed along to someone else. Some of these books will be sent away to schools in remote and isolated parts of the country.

At the present time several thousand books which have been collected during the past two months are being shipped from the chapter office to the County Superintendent of Schools in remote Montana and New Mexico counties so that school may open in the fall with the friendly greetings of Chicago juniors. From time to time during the school year, additional lots will be sent to these same schools and new ones added to the list.

The project is being conducted under a committee of the Junior Red Cross Student Council and the Auxiliary Council of the chapter under the chairmanship of Miss Jean McKeever, 4513 N. Paulina street, a student at Mundelein College with Robert Gilchrist, Flossmoor, student at the Harvard School for Boys as co-chairman.

Michigan Strawberries to be on Sale Here Soon

Strawberries from the municipal market at Benton Harbor (Mich.) soon will be finding their way into Highland Park homes through distribution facilities of the Highland Park fruit and vegetable buyers and truckers who last year brought southwestern Michigan products to this city.

The southwestern Michigan strawberry crop soon will approach peak values. It is eight to ten days late this year and will be offered in Highland Park stores at a time when Illinois and Indiana berries have been harvested.

Abundant rains have given berries large size, and recent warm weather has added sugar and color to the fruit. This will make the strawberries especially popular with the housewife for sauce, strawberry shortcake, canning, and preserves.

Last year's drought which hit Michigan as well as Illinois dried up berry patches around Benton Harbor. The offering on the market there was only 90,323 crates--a small part

of the average yield. But this year the weather has been more favorable, and Highland Park truckers and fruit buyers will find an abundant supply of quality strawberries--all under inspection of the Michigan Agricultural Department.

Yet Another Expense for Illinois Motorists

Doll-up license plates on the rear of all motor vehicles, with a number of new gadgets attached, are in store for Illinois motorists should S. B. 435, now pending in the legislature at Springfield, be passed, according to a Legislative Bulletin issued by the Illinois Automobile Club.

Under the provisions of this proposed law, the numbers on the rear license plate would be perforated and the plate itself would be encased in a special container, lock, sealed and illuminated. Inside the container would be a red light and a reflector, and the red light would be so constructed as to flash intermittently when the brakes were applied.

"Here is another method for collecting money from the motorist," commented Carl A. Barrett, president of the Illinois Automobile Club. "A special container to carry the license plate is hardly necessary as a safety measure, while the present tail and brake lights seem to meet all the necessary requirements of traffic. If a motorist wants to 'dollar up' his license plate, that is one thing; but to require it by law is quite another."

Bible Conference To Be Held at Long Lake

The North Shore Bible Fellowship will sponsor a Bible conference at Long Lake, 13 miles west of Waukegan on Belvidere Road, from August 19 to 25, inclusive.

The fellowship sponsoring the conference is independent, fundamental, and interdenominational, according to an announcement of the conference sent out last week. The theme of the conference is to be "That in all things He might have the preeminence!"
