Handle Fireworks Carefully!

With the approach of another Independence Day comes a warning from the State Department of Public Health of the dire results which frequently accompany injudicious celebrations with the glamor and noise of fireworks. Of the 1,242 people in Illinois who have been victims to fatal lockjaw since 1919, one of every three was a boy between 5 and 15 years of age and the mortality is significantly concentrated around the Fourth of July, according to Dr. A.C. Baxter, assistant director of the Department.

During June and July, Dr. Baxter said, "there are nearly as many fatalities from lockjaw as in all the remaining months combined. Every third victim is a boy under high school age. These youngsters begin shortly after the middle of June to announce in no uncertain terms the approach of Independence Day. With the general disturbance of the peace the number of tetanus or lockjaw victims begin to increase."

"Wounds inflicted by powder burns and especially by blank cartridge guns are particularly liable to cause an infection with tetanus. Injuries of this type drive into the flesh the tetanus germs which are so often present in dust and soil. While injury from firecrackers and toy pistols are by no means the only wounds that predispose and lead to lockjaw they are the most hazardous in this respect. Clean-cut wounds which bleed freely are much less dangerous."

"While great improvement in the prevention of lockjaw has taken place in recent years, upwards of fifty lives are still lost annually in Illinois with young boys as the principal victims. Any wound that carries dust or dirt into the flesh may result in tetanus, but injuries from fireworks are most likely to do so."

"Proper treatment of the wounds and the use of tetanus antitoxin will usually prevent the disease."
