

President Roosevelt Sends Greeting To Deerfield Centennial

Deerfield's one hundredth birthday anniversary celebration is over. Telegrams from President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Governor Henry Horner, and a Cadwell descendant, were read by Mayor Harry E. Wing, extending congratulations to Deerfield.

The centennial commemoration began Friday, June 28, with the opening of the historical exhibit, which continued to Monday and attracted huge crowds. Three completely furnished rooms, with an attractive open fireplace (built by Raymond Dobbins) were in the building east of the postoffice. Here every afternoon Dr. Dorothy Davis sang songs of bygone days with Miss Frances Biederstadt at the organ. The building west of the postoffice housed a varied collection of antiques mostly the prized possessions of descendants of local early settlers.

Homecoming day, Friday, was cloudy with showers, preventing many from picnic reunions. The band concert that evening by the Fort Sheridan Band was held inside of the Masonic Temple because of rain.

Saturday was an ideal day with plenty of sunshine, opening with a fine parade headed by Raymond Dobbins, marshal, dressed as an early trapper, riding a white horse. Space does not permit details of each entry, as all were excellent. The old fashioned vehicles, covered wagons, oxen, and people in old costumes brought out the historical part of the parade.

Music by the snappy and trimly uniformed Commonwealth Edison Drum and Bugle Corps added zest to the affair. The Highwood Junior Legion Bugle Corps brought much applause, also, to the young musicians, who marched like professionals.

Many beautiful floats and gaily decorated autos brought forth praise from the sidelines.

The ballgame which followed attracted a good crowd.

Dinner was served on the high school grounds by Harding caterers of Chicago.

The pageant that evening in an outdoor setting, directed by Miss Phyllis Seago, assisted by Jane Ashman, was beautifully and capably presented—but because of the huge crowds and lack of seating space it was unseen and unheard by hundreds—many of whom had come from great distances. The pageant script, written by Harriet Gastfield and Irene Rockenbach, was an authentic account of Deerfield's history. Carl Berning, as narrator, in professional manner, prepared the way for each scene. Each role was well portrayed.

Following the pageant-drama was the street dance on Westgate Road, with Sturtevant's Chanticleers orchestra attracting both young and old.

Sunday was the closing day of the Centennial with an open air union vesper service of the four local churches held in the same location where the pageant had been given the previous evening. "The groves were God's first temples," and Dr. Smith, president of Garrett Biblical Institute, in Evanston, delivered a stirring Centennial message, in an ideal outdoor setting. The minister of the Presbyterian Church, Dr. William F. Weir, of the Bethlehem Evangelical Church, Rev. Earl J. Bruso, and of the St. Paul's Evangelical Church, Rev. F. G. Piepenbrock had part in the services, and the choir of the Holy Cross Catholic Church sang anthems, with Mrs. John J. Rink as soloist.

Special credit for the success of the celebration goes to Miss Irene Rockenbach and Mrs. Paul M. Dietz, co-chairman of the entire project and to Mayor Harry E. Wing, and to all members of all committees. Beautiful bouquets, tokens of appreciation, were presented by Mayor Wing to the co-chairmen at the pageant Saturday evening.

Merchants helped to make the centennial more interesting by filling their windows with such remarkable displays of antiques, keepsakes, old pictures, relics, old-fashioned equipment, wearing apparel, etc. The streets were dressed in gala attire,

with banners and signs, greeting visitors, a courtesy of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Centennial committee is deeply indebted for the co-operation and service of all organizations, as well as individual men, women and children of Deerfield and the surrounding country, also for financial assistance. They wish they could mention the names of each and everyone who assisted, but space is lacking.

The candles are all blown out and the guests have departed, but the memory of Deerfield's birthday party will linger for many years.
