

### Civil Employees Fight Amendment

Washington, D. C., June 29.— Passage by the Senate of an amendment to the bill creating the Farmers' Home Corporation which stipulates that all employees earning \$4,000 or over annually, regardless of civil service status, must be confirmed by the Senate, was declared today by Luther C. Steward, president of the National Federation of Federal Employees, to constitute a new and direct attack upon the merit system.

"While leading members of the Senate, as well as the Administration generally, continue their pious lip service in behalf of the merit system, step after step is taken to insure its break-down," President Steward asserted. "It is to be hoped that the House of Representatives, having in mind the public welfare, will refuse to agree to this latest spoils action on the part of the Upper House.

"This amendment, which specifically provides for confirmation by the Senate of FHC employees whose annual salaries are \$4,000 or more, is an open and brutally frank concession to the spoilsmen who, after more than two years of job-debauchery, are still unsatisfied.

"In raising his voice against the Senate action, Senator O'Mahoney did not over-state the case when he declared that 'it will wreck the entire civil service system.' However, Senator O'Mahoney's warning was unheeded, and the amendment went through.

"This move is but one of a long succession of steps, by which the spoilsmen for the past two years and more gradually have been gaining full sway. Their control over the new agencies is almost complete; and as the months have gone by encroachments in the old established departments and establishments have become deeper and increasingly brazen.

"For more than two years the National Federation of Federal Employees has been calling attention to the progressive undermining of the merit system as the worst possible threat to our governmental institutions. The result has been a rising tide of protest on the part of press and public; a protest which, however, has been boldly ignored by influential legislators and administrators.

"The time has come for concerted action to save the merit system from complete spoliation.

"This issue is the most pressing single problem before the American people today.

"Constructive action is demanded, and that imperatively and immediately."

### KANSAS VETERANS ARE TO RECEIVE A STATE BONUS

Noel White, district service officer, informs us that veterans who enlisted from the State of Kansas and who were actual residents of the State of Kansas are entitled to a home bonus of \$1.00 per day. Claims must be filed not later than Jan. 1, 1936.

Service officers desiring information should correspond with John E. Chambers, Veterans Representative for Kansas, 310 National Reserve Building, Topeka, Kans.

Attention is called by Noel to the Veteran's regulation No. 6 (c), instruction No. 4, issued as of April 30, 1935, which allow veterans who are hospitalized and who draw no benefit from the government (unless the benefits amount to less than \$6 per month) and envelopes including stamps, will be allowed all toilet accessories, tobacco, pipes, cigars, writing paper and envelopes including stamps.

With this regulation in effect it should materially reduce the expenditures of the Auxiliary and Legion along this line.

### Summer Enrollment at U. of I. Shows Gain

Enrollment in the University of Illinois summer session is 2719, or 193 more than in 1934. Undergraduate enrollment has increased 4.89 per cent and graduate attendance 12.18 per cent.

Of those attending the summer session 526 are new students who have never attended the university before and 2,193 have had former attendance here, G. T. Tuttle, registrar, said today.

Among the undergraduate students are 165 who are married and in the Graduate School 467 are married. About 50 per cent of those in attendance are school teachers.

The number of men enrolled this summer is 1,541; the number of women, 1,178. The average age of undergraduate men students is 22.71; of undergraduate women, 25.60. The average age of men enrolled in the Graduate School is 29.08; of women, 30.25. The average age of all men students is 25.80; of all women students, 26.89.

In addition to the summer session registration at Urbana-Champaign there are 74 students enrolled for summer work in the professional schools in Chicago, divided as follows: Dentistry, 20; Graduate School, 54. Seventy of these are men and four are women.

Occupation of parents or guardians of University of Illinois students enrolled this summer include: agriculture, 730; professions (medicine, dentistry, law, journalism, the ministry, teaching), 578; business, 796; and laborers, 449.

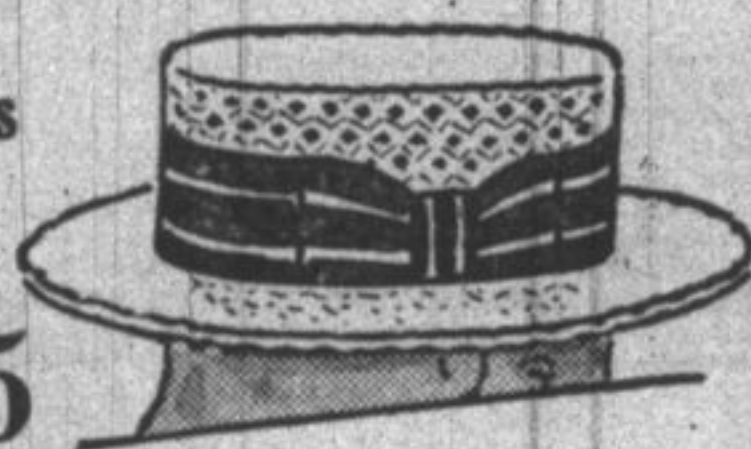
